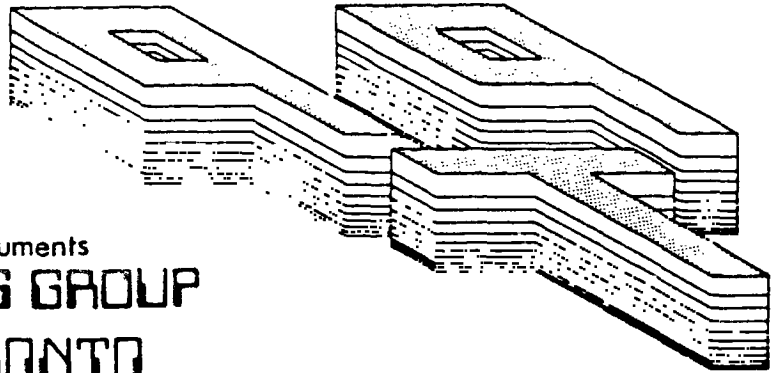

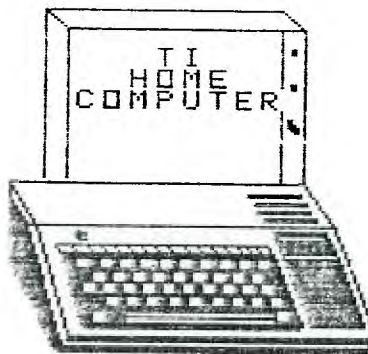

WE NEED A NEW NAME  
FOR FREEWARE?

FREEWARE is the registered trademark of Headlands Press of Tiburon, California. A registered trademark held by any firm or individual may not be used without their consent. Please refrain from using the term FREEWARE in any 99/4A related publications.

The IBM PC community created the concept of a program author sharing software with other computer owners on a trial basis, the user is allowed to try the software by simply forwarding a disk, mailer and sufficient postage for its return. If the software is useful to the individual, they are then requested to forward a donation to the software author. The idea was to obtain high quality software from individuals who like to program but are really not interested in selling their wares through a commercial firm. The term FREEWARE was coined by the IBM community to identify the concept of software sharing.

The problem that both the IBM and TI 99/4A communities are experiencing is identical.

Too many people who think the software is FREE, are obtaining copies and NOT FORWARDING a donation to the author . Ceasing to use the registered trademark FREEWARE will alleviate some of the confusion that the programs are not really FREE.

A new term is needed to represent software created by non commercial programmers in the TI 99/4A community. TRIWARE is a suggested new term to denote software previously identified as FREEWARE. The first three (3) letters TRI possess a double meaning. An I was substituted for the Y in try. It was selected to specifically remind people that the software was available for them to try before sending funds to the author. You are simply requested to forward a minimal donation if the software meets your requirements AND will be used on a daily basis.

The second meaning of TRI stands for the three phases of this unique software sharing idea. The three phases are:

- (1) A programmer creates the software.
- (2) Distribution is allowed to interested members of the computer community.
- (3) Receipt of donations from regular users of the software program encourages the creation of additional work.

Our primary dilemma is that too many persons are stopping at step two while continuing to use the software on a daily basis. There have been no visible effects on the supply of software yet!!! Conversations with software authors tend to make me believe the authors will be very reluctant to release programs in the future if this trend is not reversed. Comments to the effect, "I mailed out 600+ copies and received payment for 118 copies."

I do not wish to continue on this distasteful subject any longer. The continued supply of software is in the hands of every TI 99/4A owner. We must all pay something for software of useful value or no more will appear. It really is that simple!

POPULAR COMPUTING ran an editorial on the piracy of commercial software in their October, 1985 issue. One paragraph covered software piracy better than any other I had read. The paragraph is typed below in its entirety.

"Software is clearly a commodity, a product created by an individual or group of people. It takes time and money to write and publish a program, and those who invest their time and money want to be compensated when the programs are used. People deny the compensation to the software authors whenever an illegal

copy is made. Most software piracy takes place in the thief's own home. Their opinion (the software pirate(s) or THIEF(S)) is that whatever they do in the privacy of their own home is nobody's business, and ethics and the law be damned."

TRIWARE is not a registered trademark of THE NATIONAL NINETY-NINER or THE 99'ERS ASSOCIATION. The term may be freely used to represent software distributed by authors under the SHAREWARE, FREeware, FAIRWARE concepts. You are encouraged to notify other members of the TI 99/4A community and urge them to adopt this term. After all, the word does have TI within it to denote our orphan computer even though the letters are not adjacent.

Bob Boone of the Ottawa TI99/4A User Group has a book available called the TI-INTERN, a GPL manual published in W. Germany, written in English, which can be a very powerful tool for the advanced GPL programmer.

Corcomp will be releasing the 99 HOME SENTRY, a software package designed for the TI99/4A to use the BSR or Radio Shack Plug n Power controllers for turning on and off lights and appliances and monitoring

home security devices. Availability should be about the time you read this (Feb/March 86) price unknown as of this time.

PE BOX FLEXIBLE EXTENSION  
RIBBON CABLE

Coming soon to your neighbourhood, a short 44 wire ribbon style extension cable so that you can displace that big rectangular fire-hose connector on the righthand side of the console to an area behind the console. This small addition will also allow flexibility in moving the console around to suit various typing positions without the hazard of disconnecting the PE box accidentally and other associated connection problems that we have all experienced.

The maximum unshielded length is about 15-18 inches (I have been using one 15 inches long for about 3 months without any problems). Longer ones will be available but must be shielded (a cable 30 inches long has been tested ok).

These extensions may NOT work on all console/PE box combinations and if so returns will be accepted. Approximate cost will be \$30.00 with delivery 4-6 weeks depending on parts availability. See Randy for details.

SLAVE KEYBOARD

Did you know that you can add a slave keyboard in parallel to your TI99/4A console keyboard. By using a 15 pin (minimum) to 25 pin D-submini connector at the back of your console, almost any practical length of cable (round multi-conductor or ribbon cable) can be used (min. 15 conductor). Lengths tested by 9T9 members have exceeded 250 ft. (76.25m) and can quite probably be much longer! This is possible because the TI99/4A keyboard is made up of only N.O. (normally open) switches.

The extension cable system can be hardwired to the existing 15 pin connector wires between the keyboard and the motherboard or a connector can be made up to piggyback between the existing keyboard connector and motherboard pins. The only other item required besides another keyboard (available as surplus almost everywhere) will be a suitable enclosure for the slave keyboard. I have used a Hammond #1456 Desktop Console Model #PH3BKBU (or PH3WHBU) which gives enough room to add a numeric keypad and other switches as ideas grow. I made up a cutout template for this console and is available for the asking.

Thanks to Neil Allen for the extensive cable length testing.

RAMDISK IS HERE

I have just received a letter from David R. Romer of HORIZON COMPUTER, LTD. in Ohio regarding the HORIZON RAMDISK.

It is available in three (3) different versions:

- 1> Bare Board Ramdisk Kit  
\$50.00
- 2> Single Sided Built  
Ramdisk  
\$180.00
- 3> Double Sided Built  
Ramdisk  
\$230.00

These prices are all in U.S. dollars with shipping included within the continental U.S. The operating system and source code come on three (3) diskettes and with the manual are included in the price.

Quantity pricing is available only for orders on Bare Boards shipped to a single address. This price is \$40.00 per board (U.S.) in a minimum quantity of 5 boards with one manual and one set of diskettes (we can make as many copies of the manual and diskettes as we may need).

Mr. Romer says that they have been operating a test group of cards for about two (2) months and feel that the test group has served its function, so the Horizon Ramdisk is available for immediate distribution.

I suggest that the 9T9 User Group purchase one Double Sided Built Ramdisk for the club PE Box and the members who wish to purchase the Ramdisk pool their orders and a committee set up to locate the parts to stuff the Bare Boards. After all \$190.00 U.S. can buy A LOT of semiconductors, chips, resistors, chip sockets, etc.

### TIMELINE by Randy Rossetto

So how come I haven't seen any of you Modem Raiders on T.U.G. That's TIMELINE USERS GROUP out of Laval, PQ. This nation wide BBS is run by one Charles Sinsofsky and can be reached by a local phone call from almost any major Canadian city through Bell Canada's DATAPAC network. For example in Toronto and area: 300 baud is 868-4000, 1200 baud is 868-4100.

I've asked that an application form be included in this newsletter for your convenience. If the 9T9 USERS GROUP gets enough people on this system we will set up a 9T9 User Group private section for listing special bulletins, programmes and newsletter articles. This service will be provided by the SYSOP (Charles) at no extra cost to the club or the subscribers.

At present there are over 350 general messages on TIN (Texas Instruments Netowrk) of TUG from all over the country.

This presents an excellent opportunity for TI'ers to share and propigate the use of the TI99/4A.

There is also a TCON (TeleCONference) on Thursday nights starting at 9:30 pm EST where if, all the available phone ports are occupied by TI'ers 40 people can communicate with each other or just hang around and watch the conversations go by.

Uploads and downloads will also soon be available.

So how about signing up with TUG! At 8.3 cents a minute you can't afford to make a long distance phone call to a fellow TI'er in Vancouver even to tell him about this system. The one time cost is a \$25.00 membership fee which includes the system manual and all future updates, with a \$2.00 per month minimum, if you use over \$2.00 in a month you pay for your total usage.

I am enjoying the system when I have time to get on it but I have only one question, AM I THE ONLY TI'ER ON THIS SYSTEM IN THE TORONTO AREA?
