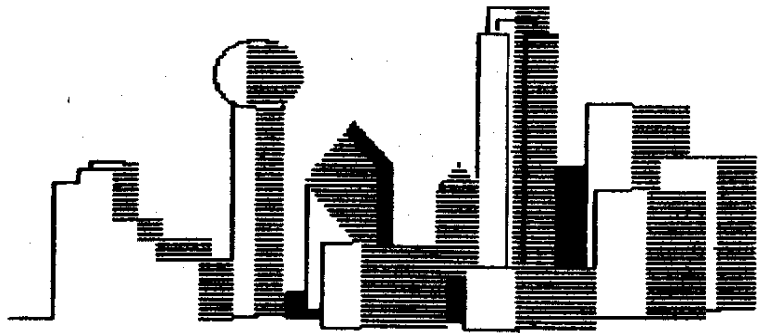

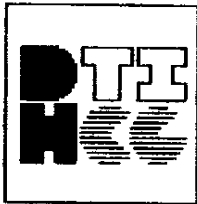

Software vendors were plentiful as was hardware that ranged from museum stock like the 99/4, 99/2, and the 99/8 all the way to Bud Mill's new Horizon 1-meg RAM disk. Rave-99 was showing their newest Memory Enhancement System which retains memory for four or five days by using a 1-Parad capacitor! Myarc, Inc., continued their lack of support for Myarc products in the Dallas area by failing to show up due to personal emergency on the part of their representative. Myarc's only known previous Dallas efforts had been to send two half-baked prototype computers which either did not work or which were not supported with demonstration instructions. It would seem that they are trying to commit suicide in one of the nation's top-ten largest marketing areas, wouldn't it?

I found out how nice it is to be able to put faces with the names I have been reading about in Micropendium and in BBS files from coast to coast. I always thought it sort of corny that every review one reads mentions this fact, but it is really one of the nicest aspects of this international gathering. SOFTWARE LIBRARY

A copy of the DTIHCG Software Library catalog may be obtained from the librarian in one of the following formats. Copies are free, but you must provide blank diskettes to replace those you are given:

- 6 SSSD diskettes
- 3 DSSD diskettes
- Printed copy (by prior arrangement, only)

Programs are provided by COMPLETE disk only for a service charge of \$2.00 per disk (you SEE "CORNER", page 16

"CORNER" (continued from page 15) provide the diskette) or \$3.00 per disk (we provide diskette, mailer and postage). Additionally, the group schedules periodic meetings at which you may copy as many disks as you wish for one, "flat" fee.

At last count, there were over 235 diskettes in our library. Members are encouraged to donate copies of public domain or freeware programs at any time; please see the software librarian to do so.

Many programs are also available (or can be made available) on cassette. See the librarian for more information.

CARTRIDGE LIBRARY

Over 70 DIFFERENT software cartridges are available for a one month checkout from our cartridge librarian! This service is an excellent way to try out some of these titles that are not available in any other format, before you buy a copy of your own. See the cartridge librarian during normal group meetings to get an up-to-the-minute list and check out your personal favorite.

As with the other DTIHCG libraries, members are encouraged to contribute modules that they find are no longer being used. Especially appreciated are those with complete, intact, original documentation.

ADVENTURE LIBRARY

Like the cartridge library, our Adventure Library works on a one month checkout basis. Original, complete versions of these programs are available for you to try before you purchase your OWN copy. See the Adventure Librarian for a complete list of the games currently available. A limited number of adventures are also available in cassette form.

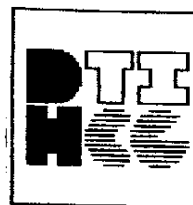
In the past few months there has been a problem (although small at the moment) of members not returning cartridges or other materials by the prescribed deadline, that SEE "CART", page 18

 being one month from the check-out date or, roughly, at the following INFOMART meeting. I want people to know that I understand there are times when circumstances do not permit a member to attend a meeting. However, if you have checked out club-owned property, be it cartridges, an adventure game, or a piece of equipment, it is the member's responsibility to contact the custodian of the merchandise BEFORE the INFOMART meeting to let them know that the merchandise will not be returned on time. In the case of the Cartridge Library, such notification would allow me to replace the cartridge(s) with a suitable replacement before the meeting, in case someone else wants to check-out that package. Because I have limited room in my carrying cases (and I have no intention of going to three or four cases unless the actual title count warrants it), I am forced to carry only ONE copy of each software selection that is contained in the Cartridge Library. Because we have duplicates of so many cartridge titles, however, replacing the title, should a member not be able to return it on time, is not a problem in most cases. Therefore, I ask anyone who checks out club-owned merchandise to please contact the appropriate custodian should you be unable to meet the deadline for returning it. This will help the custodians out, as well as show consideration for your fellow members.

 Jim Leshar of us have a 2400 baud, "they" ----- are already talking 9600 and even 19200. "They" are referred to as companies like Hayes and U. S. Robotics. The article in "Computer Shopper" says that U. S. Robotics is offering large discounts to sysops on their 9600 bauds, in an attempt to seed the market. A Hayes 9600 baud modem retails for only \$1299 but the article said you may be able to pick up a U. S. Robotics for about \$500. I wonder what Avatex is asking? The reason for the gaudy prices is that it takes a lot of electronic magic to be able to send info over noisy telephone lines at that rate, and these prices are not expected to come down much. Now there looms on the horizon an all new method of sending data over the phone lines, ISDN or "Integrated Services Digital Network." Actually it's not new, the TV people have been talking about sending digitized information over ordinary phone lines for a long time. But the writer of this article thinks that this system will blow the now used analog systems out the window, and baud rates will soar to unimaginable heights. So his advice is, don't buy a 9600 baud modem too soon, wait for the ISDN, about 3 years.

So, to use the program correctly you must fill lines 8 through 13 with the words or phrases of your choice. As an example lets do line 8 which will hold the 'part of body' info:

8 DATA NOSE,NECK,EAR,X

When the program RUNs it will randomly choose one of those three body parts and plug it in to the correct location. For each category you will be allowed to ENTER up to as many as 50 separate items just as long as you end the DATA category with an 'X' as this tells the program to go on to the next category. For instance, if you RESEQUENCE the program to add extra body parts, it might look like this:

8 DATA NOSE,NECK EAR

9 DATA THROAT,TOE,FINGER

10 DATA EYE,FOOT,X

NOW your Curse-Maker has 8 body parts to choose from. Remember, don't leave the DATA descriptions (I.E. PART OF BODY) in your DATA statements as they are only there as reminders.

The rest is up to you and I urge you to be creative, especially when you get to the EMBARRASSING LOCATION and ORGAN OF ELIMINATION parts. Think of things like "The Pope's house" or "Your daughters wedding (She should be so lucky)" or "Trouser snake", you get the idea. If you think this program is a little less than sensible then "May your sex life be as good as your credit!"
