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

My name is Stanculescu Marin and I have one "TEXAS INSTRUMENTS TI 99-4A COMPUTER", but I have not soft.

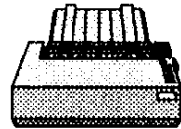

## BASIC PRINTING

These programs are written on a Star Gemini printer and may or may not work on another brand. This is about the most basic programs for a printer. It could all be put on one line in Extended Basic.

### "PRINTB" BASIC PRINTING

The printer must first be addressed with the OPEN #1 "PIO". You can use OPEN#2 OR #3 OR #99 as long as you use the same number in the PRINT # line. Notice the text to be printed is in quotes.

Just suppose you wanted to put these names or words closer together for some reason. Replace the comma with a semicolon ";". In fact it puts the words so close together you will need to have a space be-

tween the "Y" in DOLLY and the quote marks to have any space at all. Notice also we have a FOR NEXT loop in the program to print the name 5 times. If this were an address label printing program, it would print out 5 labels. Of course it would need a few changes.

Now suppose you want to have more space between lines. Colons following the print line will give you this result. Each colon ":" will give one line of spacing. In basic the colons can be together ::. In extended basic they must be one space apart : : : etc. Run this program twice to see the effect.

This program has the option to print out anything you type in, up to 255 characters and spaces. And if you will notice, it too has extra spacing. ## HAVE YOU EVER WONDERED?

Why do our meeting dates keep changing? I've heard this question a number of times lately, especially from our newer members. Perhaps a little background information will help you to more fully understand why things happen the way they do.

When DTIHCG was formed, meetings were held at the same time and place each month. When we joined the Computer Council of Dallas, that changed. Like the other user groups that form the CCD, we began to meet on the Saturday that INFOMART was available to the CCD.

More people became aware of us because we were meeting at INFOMART with the other user groups. In fact, our membership doubled during our first year of INFOMART meetings and has remained stable ever since. The disadvantage of meeting at INFOMART is that we do not always meet on the same Saturday of the month. The meeting dates we now have are firm only 120 days in advance due to the contract the CCD has with INFOMART. I've heard some of you ask why the CCD is willing to accept a contract that lets INFOMART change the dates. The reason is simple.

In return for allowing INFOMART to change our meeting dates if they are offered another booking, we get a substantial rent reduction. This arrangement has benefits and drawbacks for both the CCD and INFOMART. They have more flexibility in booking shows. The CCD has excellent meeting facilities that accommodate more people with a larger variety of interests than any other coalition of user groups I've heard about.

I've also heard some of our group ask, "Just what is the CCD, anyway? And why should we care what it does?" The CCD is a not-for-profit corporation. It is not a part of INFOMART. Instead, it is a group of affiliates made up of various user groups. In order to become part of the CCD, a group must meet certain requirements and must apply for membership. One of the things required of affiliate groups is that they provide volunteer workers to the CCD. One of the unique things about the CCD is that all of the planning that goes on to make things happen on Super Saturday is done by volunteers. That's right! The room assignments, the Super Saturday Program, the meeting room setup and teardown, meeting room signs, information for the overhead projectors, vendor area setup and teardown, and all of the off-site work done for both the upstairs user group things and the basement vendor area is done by volunteers. The user groups that are affiliates provide several hundred man-hours of volunteer time each month just to put on each Super Saturday. In return, they get free meeting rooms, the chance to visit other user groups, and access to more vendors than any single user group could attract. That's a major advantage of meeting with over 2500 other users.

"If the user groups don't pay rent, who does?" The CCD pays INFOMART. The money comes from the income from the table rental in the basement vendor area on Super Saturday. That's why you have two reasons to visit the vendors in the basement area -- to help pay the rent and to save yourself money. You can find a lot of computer-related merchandise. Jim Leshner is there every month with TI-99/4A merchandise. But Jim isn't the only vendor who has things you can use. All computer systems can use printers, printer ribbons, paper, labels, modems, cables, books, disk drives, power strips, memory chips, printer supplies, etc. Because there is a lot of competition for customers, you can find merchandise for less than you might pay otherwise.
