## DORTIG at LUBBOCK 1998 FEST WEST MEETING AT HOME OF TI99/4A

### PREPARATION

Will I Won't I. First thought was to have a two week holiday in Florida and fly from Florida to Lubbock, stay there Friday to Sunday then back to Florida for the rest of the holiday. However Gladys was not happy about spending time alone or coming to the FestWest computer meeting so I decided to go alone, leave Thursday come back Monday.

Trevor Stevens kindly sent me the information he had on the Fest West meeting and description of the Sheraton Hotel. I did ask Trevor, by letter, if he as the Chairman of the TI99/4A Users Group U.K. As I had no reply to this letter I presumed that there was no message for me to deliver. Sorting out flights to Lubbock, first I intended to fly out on Friday 13th of Feb! but on receiving the full information saw that there was an introduction meeting on Friday at 2:00pm so that meant changing the flight to arrive late Thursday night.

Now to book the hotel room had problems phoning the Sheraton but on receiving the full information saw and getting them to understand about the special arrangements for the Fest West meeting. Contacted Tom Wills and he had a word with the hotel people and I got booked in. Now Gladys got this bug that had struck a lot around this area and she was pretty ill so I was on the point of cancelling and perhaps go to Lima later in the year. However Gladys recovered a bit and we decided I should go as our daughter could stay with her and her brother and family live next door. Next to book on the bus to Heathrow, did not want to fly from Gatwick as that meant two bus journeys.

### DEPARTURE

Bus left POOLE 07:30 so JULIE, daughter, collected me and took me to the

bus station, getting from Poole to Heathrow by bus is no problem, it's the drag through the airport that takes the time and trouble. When I booked the flight I was told DIRECT TO DALLAS then Flight to Lubbock. On checking I was told 'oh no you fly to New York J.F.K. airport then catch a plane to Dallas!!'. The carrier was American Airlines (AA) Airbus 300 very nice and comfortable I had a window seat though due to cloud saw very little of the land. Spent most of the time watching the flight path on the little T.V. screen which each passenger has in the back of the seat in front. You can watch films or play games if you wish to play, I prefer to read, drink, eat, and sleep.

Arrived at NY on time and once through customs once more walked miles looking for the AA booking in desk for Dallas. NO smoking in the waiting area but I found a bar inside the airport where I enjoyed a welcome beer and a fag. Left J.F.K airport on AA flight to Dallas, still on a window seat but no T.V. had a meal and a drop of the HARD STUFF to keep me going. Arrived in Dallas 22:00hrs got myself sorted for the flight to Lubbock, plane was a SAAB Turboprop 32 seater, which we had to board a bus to reach, oh yes it was raining hard and cold!!! Arrived at Lubbock at 23.00 dry but cold glad I wore a good warm coat, contacted the hotel to pick me up and while waiting had a talk with the crew of the plane that I had arrived on. After approx: 25min wait the car arrived and I was on me last lap had a good conversation with the driver as he explained the road signs that they have in Texas. Booked in got me room and before long I was in the 'Land of NOD.'

## MEETING

Friday after breakfast as there was nothing planned until 2.00pm, meeting people setting up of stalls ect.: I decided to have a look around Lubbock. Just along from the hotel was the Buddy Holly Walk of Fame, a statue of Buddy Holly on a raised circular plinth, like a small roundabout, and on the wall were plaques to people of Texas who had become famous for various works of art, music or showbusiness. Nearby was the Civic Centre, so in I went looking for the Tourist Information, as I had written to them for information and had no reply. Met a kind gentleman who printed out a lot of information about the people on the Walk of Fame but not quite sure where the Tourist place was. Wandered off and found a post office, bought a few nicknacks and they told me how to get to the Tourist Office. The roads are very wide even minor streets, though there was not a great deal of traffic. Found, eventually, the Tourist Office, no record of my request but gave me brochures on the area. Not many shops in the area themain shopping is quite a way from the Hotel. Took a few snaps of the local Church, use me film up so I could start off with a new roll for the meeting. Managed to get myself lost, but friendly people put me on the right track(street/road) eventually arrived back at the hotel. Enquired at the reception where the meeting room was and they did not have many clues. I brought out the information sheet from T. Stevens, and they were glad to take a photocopy of the arrangements so that was of good use to them as well a me (thanks Trevor). Once that was sorted I went up introduced myself to Tom Wills and company, then John Bull arrived (he writes the Bridge program that I play to relax (swear at the TI when it keeps beating me!!). Great to meet the people who

are just voices on the phone or letters in the post.

The afternoon was spent putting up the tables ect., once more the hotel staff were not aware of the needs, getting the peoples gear up to the 2nd floor and they had loads of stuff. I of course only had a few disks that someone might find useful and my daughter gave me a set of Princess Diana's special stamps and suggested someone might want them. Tom Wills not fussy to put them in the raffle but said his dad would like them, so I left it at that. Later turned out they decided to put them in the raffle and one lady selected them so Tom gave me some dollars and when I came home I sent a present set on for his dad, who wrote me a nice letter of thanks. It turns out that Mr Wills senior was stationed, during the war, not far from where I lived in Cardiff before moving south and the invasion. A few of the people had been in the UK at some time either in the USA forces or on visits. Jack Mathis of SW99'ers, he who modified DM 1000 so it would run on PC's, they were in UK in the US Airforce stationed in Bedfordshire (I think), but as his wife said they did not manage to see a lot of the UK. J Bull invited me for a meal, lunch with another gentleman but as I was tied up copying disks I had to give it a miss. Later went for a meal with Tom Wills and Jack Mathis and their wives for a snack. I and J. Bull had a meal and a drink in the hotel. By then weariness came over me and off to Peeky Byes as it was an early start, for me, Saturday morning visit to TI Factory.

#### Next morning...

Lobby and outside, as it was not yet 08:30 I carried on. Next thing I saw the BUS LEAVING, a few of us were left behind but one gentleman took us to the TI Complex in his people carrier (well I don't know what they call them!), and we were at TI before the bus, so I managed to take photos of them arriving. The actual meeting was described in Richard Speed's letter so except that I found it very interesting, and that I had a word with Dr Lee Kitchen I will not dwell on that part. Oh yes the overseas visitors were presented with TI Sweat Shirts, chaps from Germany and Holland. Suddenly Tom realised he had forgotten ME so the TI gentleman found a different but pretty T-SHIRT, Julie might want to borrow!! I did intend to bring it to Derby but as usual forgot. On the return to the hotel the meeting went ahead and I showed anyone who was interested the tourist information about Poole, well someone may pay a visit, and let J.Bull keep the books to show his family. I bought a few bits but at the present, I've so much stuff that 80% does not get regular use.

After the meeting Tom had an hospitality room, snacks and cold soft drinks, I remembered me duty free Whisky and Harveys Bristol Cream, no one was fussy about the whisky!! but the Sherry went down a dream, J.Bull, a parson, said he thoroughly enjoyed the Harveys. John and I then went for a meal after which he went to bed as he had to be up early driving a good way south to visit his sister while he was in the area. I found the bar where a few were having a drink so I joined them and spent a pleasant hour talking and drinking.

SUNDAY

A BRUNCH (morning lunch?) laid on for everyone, Mike Wright was on our table and said that he had load of TI stuff for PC's on the Internet for anyone who could contact them, I believe that R Speed has them, and also could not understand why I kept getting "Error can't find CS1" on my PC. This now cleared since I reformatted the C disk must have got a pile of rubbish on it with my fiddling!!!. Then came the great clean up helped to tidy up and take the gear back to the transports. Then wandered down to the Civic Centre, 5min. walk from the hotel, with another chap as there was a Antique sale on, very interesting lots of old time American stuff if one is a collector (enough old time junk up in me loft!!) got a couple of nick-nacks. The lad who came with me came from Florida, hope he escaped the Tornado's and fires that have swept that State since my return. Intended to go to the shopping precinct but that was only open 2 to 4 (I think) and too far to go and required a taxi, which the hotel would arrange. I went to room for cleanup and fell asleep (not unusual for me in afternoon) so it was too late by the time I came back from the Land-of Nod. Later I went down to the bar for a Wee Drop of the Hard Stuff but due to local laws bar not open on SUNDAYS. The reception rung a local hotel and their bar was open, as it was pouring down they offered to arrange a taxi. The other hotel was only 5min. walk down the road so I said "I'll walk down, a drop of rain will do me no harm", methinks they thought me mad!. Mind you, from the reports of the dry and excessive heat Texas is having as I write this, they could do with all the rain they could get, have to post some of our SUMMER over to them!

The bar was empty when I arrived but during the couple of hours I spent 2 chaps came in, one told me that his Grandmother came from Swansea. S Wales near where I came from. The barmaid (is that what they call them in USA?) quite a pleasant young lady, and I had a good natter, then back to hotel and get ready for a early start to catch the first plane home, Lubbock to Dallas.

### USA DEPARTURE

Hotel transport took myself and the Dutch lad, Berry Harmsen to Lubbock air port where we had a coffee and I got some souvenirs while awaiting for the plane. Berry was staying in Dallas so I got on to the plane to JFK AIRPORT New York, up to date I was lucky and always had a window seat so could see a bit of the land we passed over. Once landed the big trudge began getting to the AA check-in point then when sorted headed for the bar I visited on the way out. Had me cough medicine (fag) and a couple of liquid refreshments to keep dehydration at bay. The barmaid remembered me and asked if I'd enjoyed my visit, I said "Yes but please do not wish me to "HAVE A NICE DAY, I'M FED UP ALREADY"", then the LONG drag to check-in and await our plane. This time my seat was in the centre row inside seat so no views of NY on way out.

### HOME AGAIN

Arrived at Heathrow approx. 06:00hrs caught a coach direct to POOLE, quite a good reasonable priced service, the weather warmer then when I left Lubbock, back in Poole approx. 12:00hrs where Julie met me and thus home to find Gladys had had a bad turn while I was absent, never mentioned this during our phone calls, so Julie had been staying at our house. As the

SW TI'ers stated, "Once in a lifetime experience", I enjoyed it meeting all the people but it would have been better if Gladys had been fit enough to come. Still if we had booked a fortnight in Florida we would have been there when the Tornadoes struck, that would have been something to write about.

I know I've taken a long time to get this written but I'm not a great letter writer and due to problems kept putting this off. I am still trying to transfer programs from TI to PC, it's only a 386 and even with PC99v5 in it is slow, though on Trevor (the Micro) PC the program I've typed in for him work very fast, PC99 v4A, so with a bit of luck we will get it sorted. We hope to be at Nottingham in October and look forward to seeing our group, people from Europe and USA. Must end now our Ross will be complaining about RT type letters.

## Report of the November 14, 1998 Chicago International TI Faire by Charles Good

I have been attending the annual Chicago Faire for many years. It is always nice to actually talk to TI personalities that you normally only read about, and it is nice to see the new stuff that continues to appear for our ancient but favorite computer. This year was no exception. There was interesting new hardware and software.

The Faire is "International" because european user groups are usually represented. This year Berry Harmsen was there representing the TI Club Errorfree (Germany) and the TI Gebruikersgroep (Netherlands). He had a free disk of mostly new software from these groups that he gave to those attending the Faire. Contrary to pre Faire publicity, this disk is copyable. Berry also had a european made SCSI card which he ran on a 99/4A system. Attached to the SCSI card was a zip drive set as SCS7. He used this system to demonstrate the new european software. Unlike my early production Western Horizon SCSI card, the european card had connectors for both an internal SCSI cable and an external SCSI cable (some sort of D connector). The external zip drive was attached to the external connector of the SCSI card.

The most interesting piece of software Berry demonstrated was a 40 column disk manager that is fully compatible with floppy disks, with MFM hard drives controlled by Myarc's HFDC, and with SCSI hard drives.

When you catalog the root directory of a hard drive the listing shows all the sub directories at the end of the list. If you click on a subdirectory you get a listing of that subdirectory and at the top of the list you are given the opportunity to go back to the previous (next highest) directory. You can move up and down the entire directory structure. This disk manager lets you execute copy move rename and protect files, and you can view files in ascii and hex. I have reviewed a number of 40 column disk managers in my Micropendium column, and this seems to be the best such product to date.

All 99/4A users with hard drives should check out this disk manager.

Bruce Harrison demonstrated his new TI BINGO software. It prints out bingo cards, up to 4 on a single 8.5x11 inch sheet of paper. It then speaks the bingo letter number combinations and puts the called combinations on screen for later reference. You can run an entire large scale bingo operation with this software. It is fun. Bruce also demonstrated the non AMS version of his MIDI Play In software. He convinced a member of the public to play a short piece on a keyboard and then the 99/4A played it back. The non AMS version stores up to 2400 notes. This is actually quite a bit of music.

The AMS version stores 2400 notes in each block of 6 AMS memory pages.

Lew King demonstrated how a 99/4A using Term 80 software can access the internet, read the text of web pages, and read email. The trick is to get an internet access provider to provide a unix shell account. The available Chicago internet access provider could only provide a PPP connection, which we found won't work with Term 80. Lew ended up having to telephone long distance to a known unix shell provider.

Mike Wright showed the latest development trend for PC99, a prototype Windows 95/98 version of PC99. This is a native windows 32 bit program that can make use of the various fancy features that windows provides. At the top of the PC99 window one of the options is "cartridge". Click on this, and a window opens up that allows you to select the cartridge you want to run with PC99. Another option is "size". Click on this and you get your choice of three different PC99 window sizes. Another option is "disk".

When this is made operational you can click on it and from a window load any PC99 "disk" into your various PC99 disk drives. Mike demonstrated multiple PC99 programs running on screen simultaneously, each in its own window and each running a different cartridge. This prototype is not yet ready for prime time. It is version 0.1 and was not released. Mike makes no promises when, if ever, the windows version of PC99 will be available to the public. Now for the bad news. Mike said that development of 80 column 99/4A emulation has been suspended because the programmers can't figure out how to fully emulate the actions of the 9939/9958 video chip.

Bud Mills was the best known TI vendor present. In response to a direct question from me Bud said that he still supports his products and still repairs them. People are welcome to send him their Horizon ramdisks, Pgram cards, memex cards for repair or upgrade. He said that his fees, payable after the repair is completed, would average \$35 plus return shipping. He claims that, except for a couple of cards found in a corner of his home shortly before the show, all cards sent to him for repair have been returned to their owners. Bud had some Pgrams for sale at his table.

At the informal after the faire dinner at a nearby restaurant Hal Shanafield, faire organizer, presented the 1998 John Birdwell Memorial Award for Excellence in Computing. This award is financed by shareware fees sent in by users of the late John Birdwell's DSKU (Disk Utilities) disk manager. This year's recipient was Bud Mills!!!

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
