The Prez's Blurbs

Fair...Our participation in the Eastern Iowa fair was as smooth and successful as could be. Thanks to all who helped. I was pleasantly surprised at the amount of help we had. If you feel really orphaned look at page 71 of the Nuts and Volts Magazine we got there and you will see an ad to repair TI-99/4A's.

TIW Tabs...Finally after months of searching I found the way to preset the tabs on TI writer. The RAG version 4.3 has a setup program called EDITINS that lets you preset most everything.

Trivia...Three for the price of one this month. When will the first MIDI concert be performed at Carnegie Hall? How many virus programs will the IBM program Virhunt detect and destroy? How can you find out your TI-99/4A consoles birthday?

XB.XB.Again...I have to back off from my idea of soldering the XB cartridge onto a widgeit. It works great but I have pretty much decided it is not the main problem I had. After still more crashes and intermittents I discovered that the real culprit was the right angle connector in the console. I thought I had put a new one in, but apparently when one of my keyboards gave out I got another console and thus lost the new connector. After discovering this and rectifying the situation I have had no intermittents and only one ram disk crash. That crash occurred immediately after I tried a sidecar RS232 on the system. My theory now is that those connectors got worn out very quickly back when everyone was slapping game cartridges in and out of that port. The XB had to be reinserted after any game playing to program in basic. Thus you had a worn out connector in your console and on the XB cartridge. If you can get the plastic case holding the felt on the front of that connector off you can look down into that connector and see the surface where the plating is worn off and what looks like copper is exposed. I am going to buy only "virgin" consoles from now on and swap keyboards rather than whole consoles if possible. I have noticed that my 386 hookup at work has had the same kind of connector problems. That makes it all better. Right?

BBS's...In addition to the Apple Hideaway 1-515-282-1915 in Des Moines that now has a TI section, there is also an Iowa MIDI BBS 1-515-262-1370 that may be of interest to you MIDI fans. Bruce Harrison has announced the first Midimaster song that is compiled from an IBM Cakewalk file! I have joined the CVCA BBS here in town to get on Fidonet and I am now in the process of trying to find out what if any additional charges there will be. I will have more on that as I get the information.

BBS con't..I have run into a problem on the CVCA BBS and also on the ISU computer in Ames. Some programs they run require a true ASCII escape char to exit to another area. The TI keyboard has no escape key as such. Function 9 or function equals do not give an ASCII 27 which is what they are looking for. Fortunately the last page of Telco shows the added control keys the author has put in that program. Control period (ctrl .) gives a true ASCII escape char. I feel like sending him more money. I continue to be impressed with that program again and again.

Thought for the day...A big shot is only a little shot who kept on shooting.- Of course it also helps if you actually hit something once in a while...

Misc...It may be a good idea not to pitch the old E/A cartridges. I had to use it to get the insert file function in the editor mode. I couldn't find that in the Funnelweb one. I realize it may just be I don't know where to look. The decline in the number of people who actually program on the TI was shown by a request of intent for the Chicago Users Group programming contest. They received only two letters. Another replacement for the TI-99/4A has shown up and is on the cover of the latest Popular Science. Seriously it is about the latest generation of super computers and I recommend it for some very interesting reading.

Elections...are next meeting. If you want to volunteer contact me or any officer this month. I plan to do some more calling and try to get a backup slate ready in case we are not as overwhelmed with prospects as I expect. (:))

Trivia answers...The first Carnegie MIDI concert has already been held last October according to the March 92 Popular Science. I missed it. I don't know exactly how many viruses Virhunt checks but it takes 14 screens to list them in vers 1.3. To get your consoles manufacturing date look at the number on the bottom. I recently became involved with a BBS out of Des Moines run by Scott Johnson on his APPLE IIe. Scott actually insisted I join by personally installing his extra modem on my TI.

APPLE HIDE-A-WAY BBS has the usual message center and several up/down load sections for various APPLE and IBM machines. (In late February Scott opened up a TI section but that is a different story.) In addition to the above, he set up a restricted access section called IOWANA for my family. Most of the information in this file would be ASCII files so the fact that an APPLE, two IBM's and my TI were being used should not matter.

NOT SO !

After finally getting full BBS authorization I tried to "download" the "Dad Fairs" file meant for me. This file, uploaded by my son in Omaha, turned out to be DIS/FIX 128 and was totally undecipherable by FUNNELWEB.

Again I accessed the file but used the view function of the BBS to capture the ASCII file. Using the Review Buffer function of TELCO I could finally read it. Better, but not good enough for long files. The message, now in DIS/VAR 80 format, was savable to disk or printer - only 23 lines at a time.

I tried to make a full page copy but failed and had to accept a copy my son printed off of his original and brought home at Christmas.

Scott, also home for our family Christmas, was determined that there had to be a way to accomplish a full page copy. Since the View function was the best way to get a file to be compatible with FUNNELWEB he started there. Using only the TI manuals and his own knowledge of APPLE basic he wrote a short XB program to combine the 23 line segments into a full page document.

APPEND recalls each of the 23 line sections and appends them one after the other. This now complete file can be edited with FUNNELWEB, then printed as a file. Simple but smart don't you think?

Sure, there probably is a utility somewhere that already does what APPEND does. I didn't happen to know what program to use or where to find it. Thanks to Scott I can now access these files and print them out.

Now for the rest of the story. My one and only "upload" to IOWANA turned out to be "total gibberish" to the IBM's and filled "with meaningless characters" on the APPLE. Help Scott! (or anyone else for that matter). April 1992.
