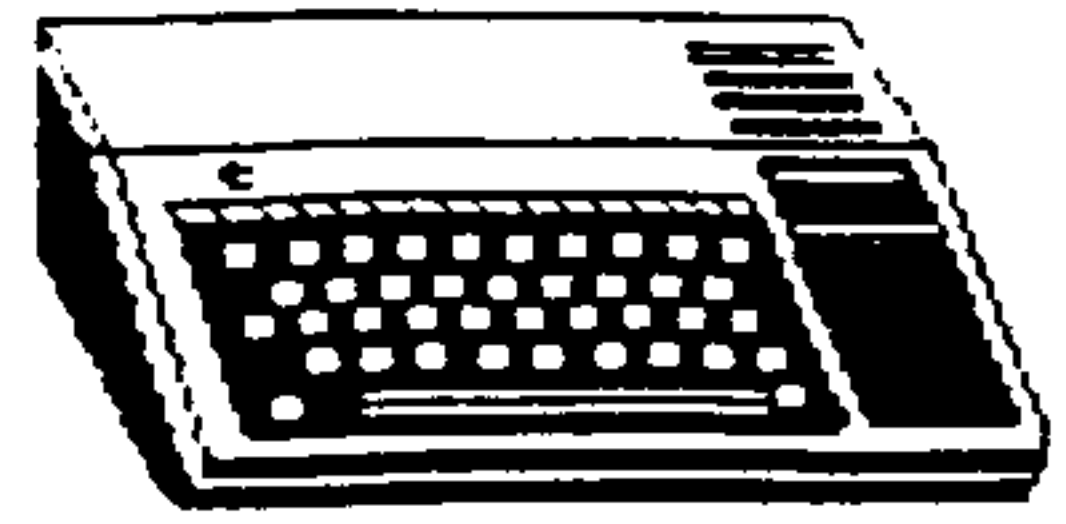

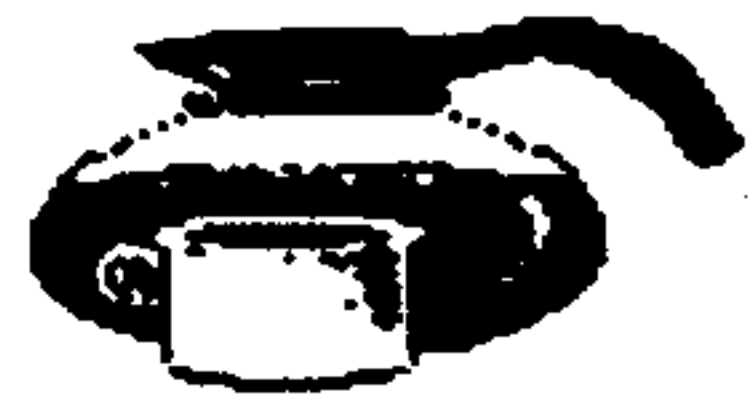

MAY 22, 1993 MEETING

The (delayed) May meeting of the Northcoast TI User's Group was called to order by Co-President Walt Ryder at 1:30 P.M. in the Euclidian Room of the Euclid Square Mall. There were 13 members present. There was no financial report so the next financial report will cover two months. Walt was quite sure that Frank did not go south with the funds.

The meeting started with a discussion of the Lima Conference. Harry Hoffman came home from the conference with 150 disks including some European software from Sweden and England, also a set of 18 disks for the stamp (U.S. only) collectors that will print out the stamp catalogues. Some new hardware was introduced, some with bad reviews and others with very good reviews.

Additional comments on the Lima Conference: There was a feeling that the attendance was about half of last year - about 160 people signed in at noon, with many not signed in. Although there was much hardware for sale the prices were varied - high and low. A couple of our members bought interfaces for the PE box ("firehose"). The demos were reported as being very good; Art Gibson had his wordprocessor for sale; Bud Mills demo'd his hardware - he stated that he will not start anything new until he completes what he was working on. Marty mentioned a program that runs TI Software on an IBM Compatible but it was very slow and requires a 486 - the feeling was that it was too expensive a deal and not worth-

There was a demonstration of the "Tower of Power" to replace the PE box and which includes a hard disk, cards etc. The designer is planning this for the Geneva at first - cost \$200. There was only one Geneva at the meeting - none for sale. There was a seminar on repairing Geneves - several boards made for the Geneva had a problem. In addition to repairs there was discussion on adding chips to improve operation. Don Malden of Cecure

Electronics repairs Geneves and Myarc HFDC cards (updated to operate cooler and better!).

Marty picked up a copy of Version 5 of the 40 column Funnelweb and he has copies available for the members. This is the version which is called Eurowriter which has the ability to write in several foreign languages.

Bruce Rodenkirch discussed the possibility that boards in the expansion box may run hot due to problems with the transformer. If the PE Box quits it may be a fuse in the primary winding of the transformer which is buried in the transformer. This is in addition to the panel mounted fuse.

It is a small glass fuse under the wrapping of the transformer and when it blows the expansion box goes dead. If the transformer is putting out a higher voltage than is necessary, the voltage regulators will heatup which in turn heats up the boards. A suggestion was made to use a "bucking" transformer to keep the voltage down within limits. Also problems can result from power company high or low voltages delivered to the house.

There was no additional old or new business and the meeting was turned over to Marty Sooley to demonstrate how his TI taught him to write letters and make labels reminding members to renew their membership.

Marty distributed copies of letters written to each member when their membership dues become due. He also distributed the details of the command files necessary to have the TI write letters and print labels. TIBASE makes it possible to use data from four different databases, checking the data and making decisions as to the makeup of the letters to be sent. Three different letters can be produced - the first when the dues are due, the second and third following up if the member does not respond. Marty admits that he has a very smart TI.

TI-CHIPS Executive Notes

The 1993 MUG Conference - Lima, OHIO

I don't know how they do it! But somehow, most likely with huge doses of dedication and talent, the LIMA TI-99/4A USERS GROUP just keeps on producing one successful conference after another! This year's MUG (Multi User Group) conference certainly lived up to its well earned reputation.

As usual, there was much to see, learn and barter for. Also, we were all given the pleasant opportunity to meet with old friends who just happen to have the same interests.

The seminars were well spaced out, and it was much easier to attend more sessions this year.

Jack Sughrue led off the day with a seminar on the benefits of using the TI-99/4A as a teaching tool. Jack recounted that it has been his delightful experience that the students in his third grade class preferred the TI-99/4A to learn with. The advanced, clear graphics and easy to understand tutorial software of the TI-99/4A made this machine an natural learning instrument. Jack said that he assigns a team of students to "LOAD" the program-of-the-day into the class TIs, at the beginning of the day, by cassette tape. The computers then run SILENTLY for the rest of the day!

One additional note of thanks to Jack. You're truly must admit that I didn't really know how to take advantage of the directory options of the BOOT programs! Jack's detailed instruction on how to "tag" a file for loading or reading has made my life such, such easier! I found that I can do the same thing with EDITOR (TI-WRITER). I think I just typed in my last filename! Thanks again Jack.

After spending "quality time" at the TI-CHIPS tables (meeting new friends, seeing old friends, handing out both a historical NOVEMBER 1983 "Decade" disk), I was able to attend a seminar by Art Gibson on his super fast word processor FIRST DRAFT. This is a super quick word processor that has a built-in spell checker that is equally fast. The speed of this program is due to the D/F 80 format of both the text and spell checker files. The DISPLAY/Fixed 80 format treats each line like a data base, and is able to flag the position of any word quickly as a RELATIVE record. The D/V 80 (DISPLAY/VARIABLE 80) text files we are so accustomed to are unable to do this because of their VARIABLE length lines. The D/F 80 file takes more space on your disk (each line is padded with spaces to make a full 80 character line, but it is a heck of a lot faster to edit.

I was able to drop in on the tail end of Mike Maksimik's demonstration of his software interfaces with a Yamaha electronic piano. What little I saw and heard was nothing short of amazing! The TI was able, through Mikes

routines, to control not only the pitch and amplitude, but also the tempo. As Mike stated, this form of instrumental control through software can lead to the real possibility for developing tutorial routines for such complicated instruments as the organ. We're all looking for what Mike has planned for the TI-99/4A.

Of course, I would be remiss if I didn't attend the MULTI USER GROUP CONFERENCE of user group officers. Charles Good started off the meeting with a request that all user groups and vendors reserve their tables at least two weeks in advance of the conference date at Lima. Tables were set up at the last minute for several attendees who didn't give the LIMA UG any advance notice of their requirements. (Author's note: The LIMA UG is providing the TI community with the ability to meet and share at NO CHARGE. These people not only deserve our thanks and admiration, but also our COURTESY!).

Charles also announced that, as of 12:30, 160 attendees signed in, and he was quite sure that many more people just walked in without registering. This is equal to, if not better, than last year's attendance! It certainly appears as though the TI-99/4A will be around for some time to come! HAPPY 10th ANNIVERSARY Tiers!

The conversation switched to the operation of the CLEARING HOUSE BBS operated by the C.O.N.W.I. group in Columbus, OHIO. We were informed that THE CLEARING HOUSE BBS has been recognized nationally. This is quite an achievement for a project conceived just 3 years ago during a Multi Users Group meeting in Lima, Ohio. A comment was made that BBS's tend to have a very short life span, but I have a feeling, with continued strong user and user group support, THE CLEARING HOUSE will be around for a long time!

The last items discussed were the cost of newsletters and community interaction. It was said that the newsletter is the heartbeat of the TI community. However, some user groups find that financing a newsletter has become prohibitive, and rely on MICROpendium for information and communication for their user group. This pointed out the value of MICROpendium to the TI community. Jack Sughrue's seminar on using the TI as an educational tool was discussed, and we found that not only would schools benefit from donations of TI systems, tutoring and repairs, but community libraries would benefit also. It was brought out that not only could TI user groups become more community involved, but it would be greatly appreciated by the schools, libraries and many other institutions.

I took time for a delicious sandwich (with all the trimmings) from the campus cafeteria. This was another service arranged for the Tiers by the LIMA UG!

Two members of the Cleveland area user groups did us all proud! Tim "Chris" Bodenmiller, of TI-Chips, conducted a very thorough and fascinating seminar on developing game graphics on the TI! Part 1 consisted of a cursory overview of the graphic effects available on the TI. Part 2, of Tim's seminar, dealt with more advanced explanations on how to plan out and execute bit map game graphics and color controls. Totally fascinating!

Ken Gladysewski set up schematic and hardware displays of his analog/digital circuit modifications of the TI joystick port. You wouldn't believe the interest Ken has generated with his much heralded hardware hacking. Both Tim and Ken displayed a level of professionalism that one wouldn't normally expect to see from home computer enthusiasts. I guess the TI brings out the best in us all!

The last seminar I attended was given by Don Walden

of SECURE ELECTRONICS. Don shared such valuable information about modifications of the PEBox power supply and the expansion boards. Don provided cautions on what to look out for, and the pitfalls of carelessness. He recommended the ecologically friendly AQUEOUS SOLDER when doing soldering work on circuit boards. This form of solder is HOT WATER cleanable. As a matter of fact, Don informed us that his company routinely washes their circuit boards, in preparation for assembly, in a dish washer! Now that's a new wrinkle, but it makes sense. Don also informed us that Ron Markus (RANCHARGED COMPUTERS) was THE source for joysticks for TI users. This was welcome news for those in attendance.

Thanks to Charles Good, Dave Szippie and all of the LIMA USER GROUP members who made a conference such as this available to the TI-99/4A community! We are forever in your debt!

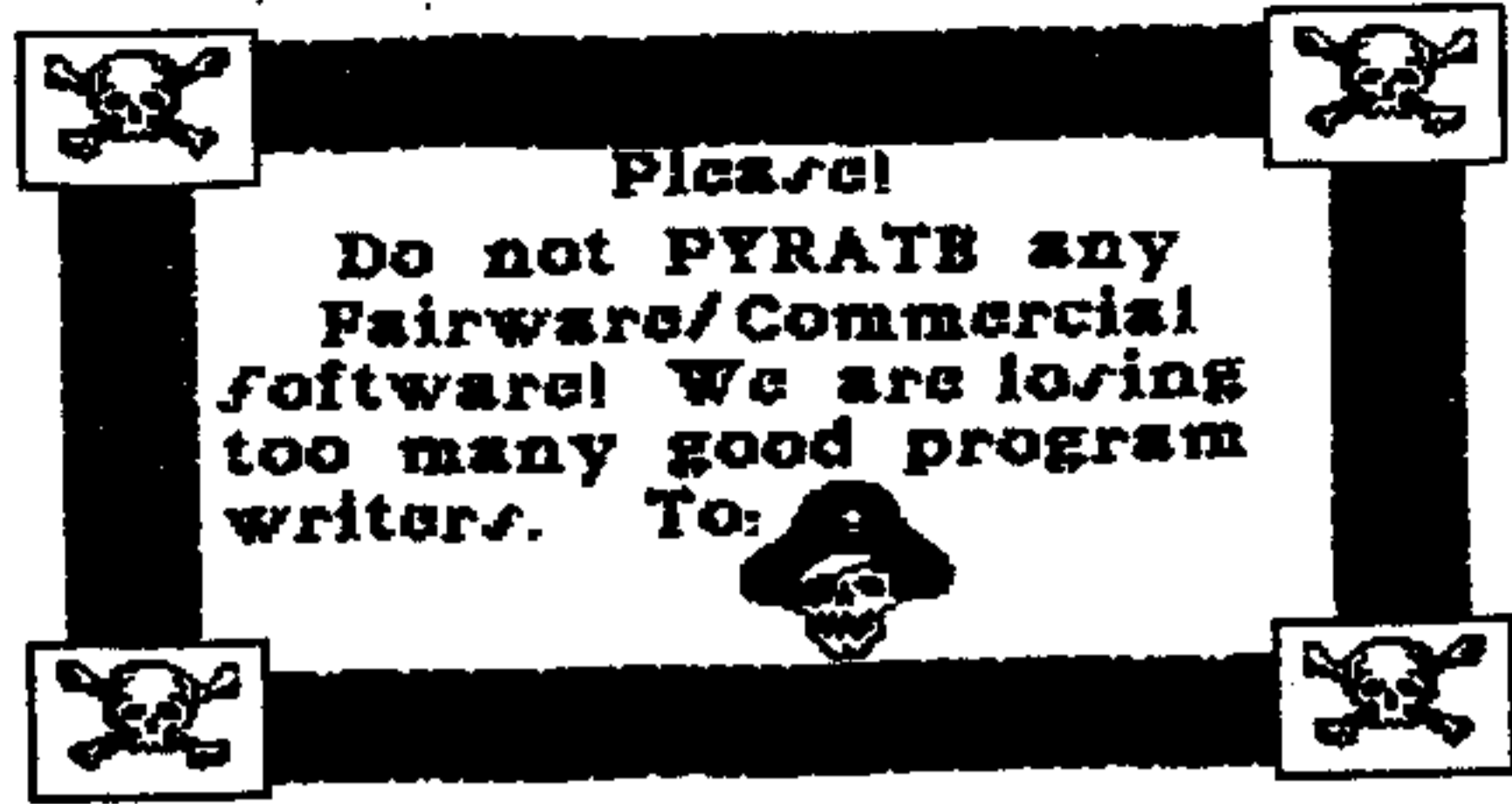
It lets you make little "windows" on the screen, and gives you greater control over text. It lets you print text at any dot row and at any dot column. It even has

it's own fancy input routine. In the area of graphics, how about being able to use TI-Artist pictures! It still lets you use Sprites (all 32 of them). And it lets you synchronize their movements on the screen. It is an excellent tool for all XB programmers, but it does take some getting used to. Thanks alot Lee, this is something we all needed to know about.

I did a brief demo, as a preview of my Lima one. My new game "Who's Behind the Mexican UFOs" uses the Missing Link, and is a text, graphics adventure. The TI-Chips disk for Lima has Glenn's lowercase routine, as well as several other excellent programs, and even some TI-Base tutorials. This disk could certainly come in handy and be quite entertaining.

There was no raffle, and the meeting was adjourned. People are all preparing for Lima, have fun!

NOTUNG SOFTWARE always has quality software and for those who don't have Ken's "Disk DF" series; this is the way to go. These fonts & borders are TI-Artist plus compatible. To convert the borders to Page Pro you have to use the Enhancement part of Artist* and flip the corners, so you have Top(left & right), and Bottom(left & right). You may have to also do a side & top center part that will convert to PagePro as a solid pic with no blank ends. TI-Artist users should know what I mean by that! Since the fonts maybe too large to convert to Page Pro, doing your text in Artist then creating an instance out of it, then convert to a PPRD picture will be your best bet.

There are three disks in this set, with 20 Fonts & 13 Borders. Some of these I've never seen before, such as SCRABBLE(with real game-like tiles), Blackboard, and GDB-GDB Blocks(just like kid's wooden blocks).

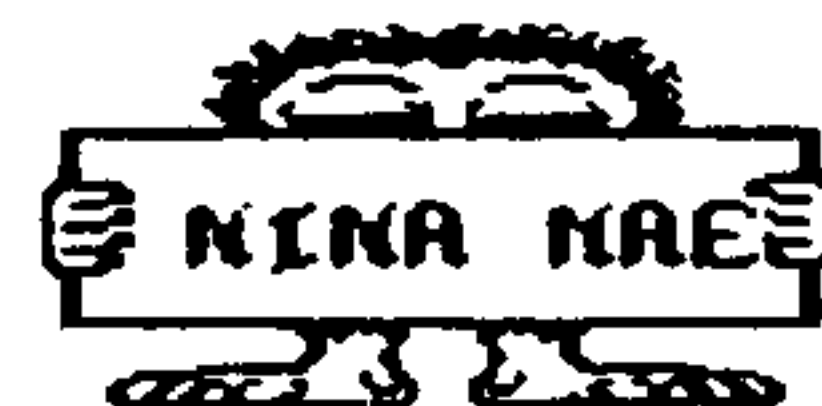

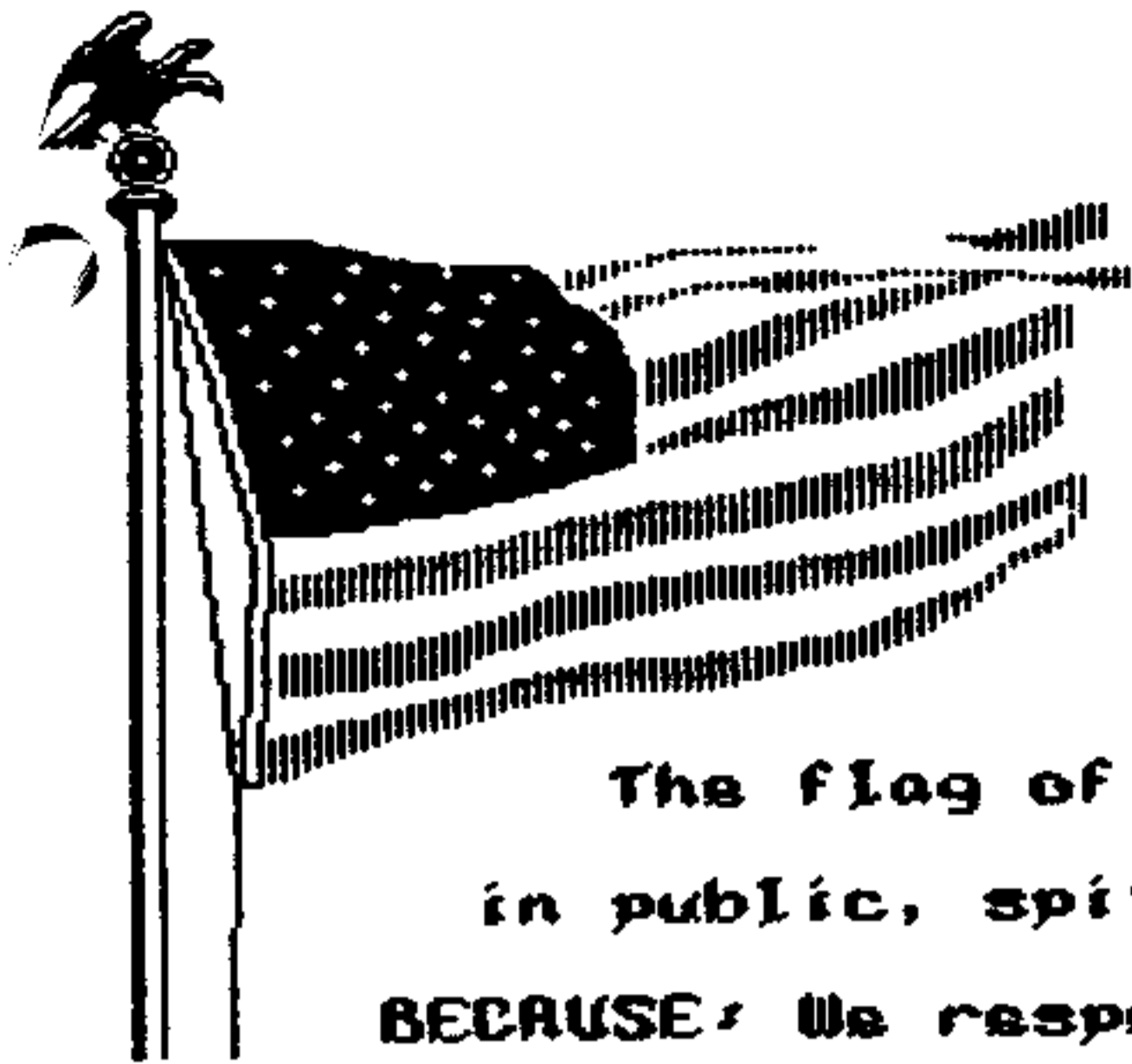
Sunday morning, we had breakfast together with our friends, said goodbye and headed for Cleveland. A good time was had by all.

as myself to remember when!

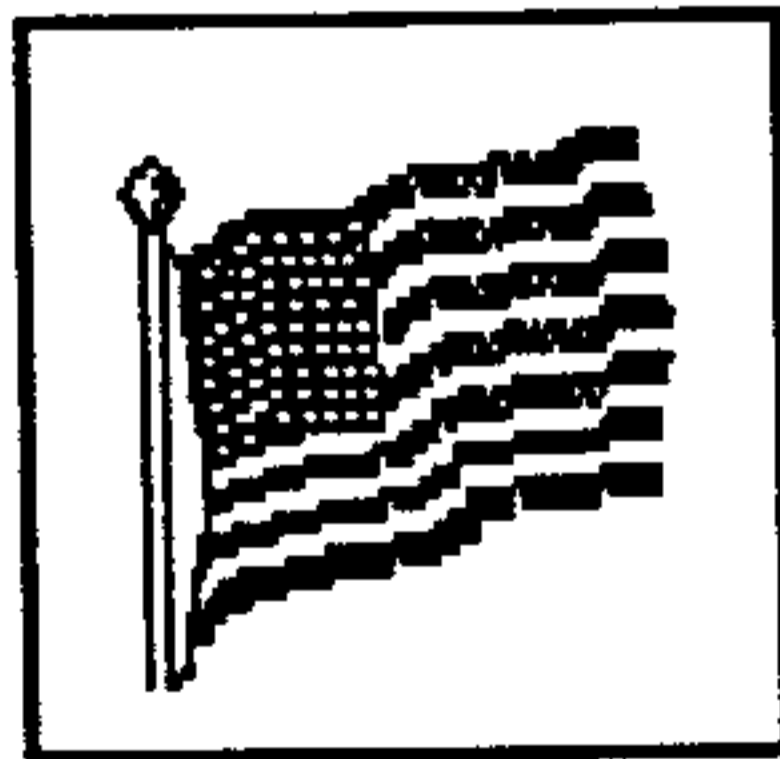
The flag of our country was never burned
