

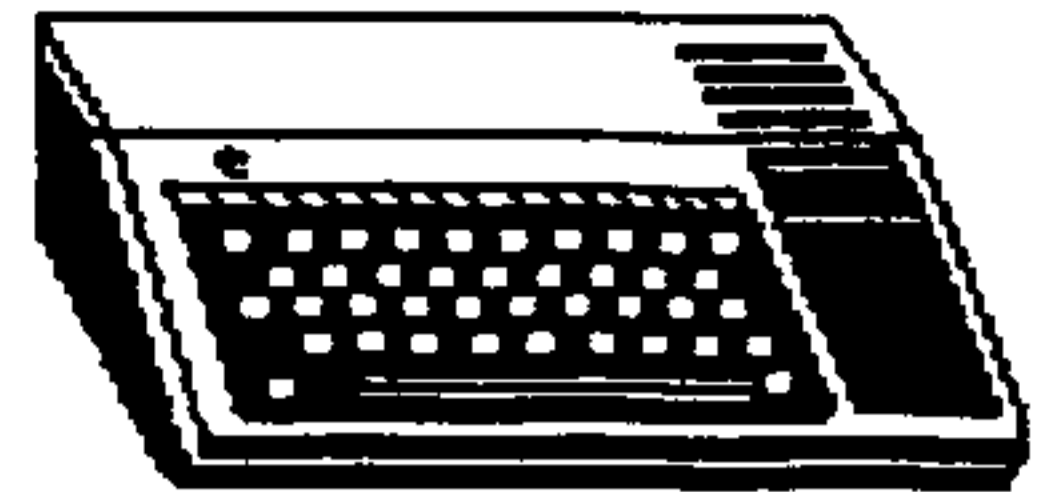

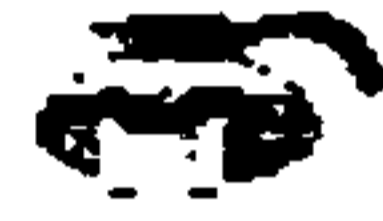

NORTHCOAST 99ERS EXECUTIVE NOTES - FEBRUARY 1996

Meeting was called to order by Walt. There was a dearth of reports, old or new business. Ken agreed to contact CHIPS and if it was needed, would volunteer to fill in for a demo.

Thus, we got right down to the demo by Ken. This wasn't really TI related, so beware. Ken has interest in restoring old cars...notably a 1967 Renault Caravalle with a removable hard top which he got a couple of years ago from a friend in Dayton. The information on this car is very scarce, and he has been attempting to find a way to retrieve and store the data he needs to restore this car.

He has turned to his computer for this project...namely the IBM compatible with all kinds of memory and storage capabilities. He walked us through his various options to get information from technical manuals (mostly out of print) to a permanent storage area where he could access them as needed.

1. He could type in the information from these rare manuals as he came across them; however, he would not have the graphics available, which sometimes was crucial to assist in the project in which he was interested.
2. You could use a video camera to shoot copies of the data.
3. You could have someone fax the information to you from their source.
4. You could scan in the information from either a hand-held or flat-bed scanner.

Ken determined that scanning in the image would give him the best of all options in that he could have the text and attached graphics that would show him how to complete his projects. That led to a quest to find the best hardware and software to accomplish this goal. He settled on a Canon IX415 with OmniPage Professional OCR software.

In case you haven't run into the terminology, OCR stands for "Optical Character Recognition". In other words, you can scan in text (as in this page) into a word processor and won't have to retype everything. Depending on the sophistication of the software, it may recognize most of the words down to a few of the words. Because scanners also come with software capable of scanning pictures, he could also have the exhibits which related to the text stored in his computer to assist him in his restoration projects.

He went into the different types of files and how much memory and space they would take up on your hard drive. He is still struggling with refining his project so that he can exchange files with others across the country who are also interested in the Renault Caravelle.

All in all, it was a very educational process to determine what kind of scanner and software is needed for different projects. Any of us who work in an office setting know what an advantage it is to be able to just scan in a page and not have to retype every word. Little page scanners that will sit on your desk between your keyboard and monitor are becoming more sophisticated and less expensive as I write this article. In fact, in the office where I work, we have a desktop scanner that allows us to scan in a typewritten page at a time without retyping relieving the secretary of many hours of tedious work.

Since I made such an issue if it, I would like to mention that I have received my CD Rom for the TI. Because of some other projects I have been involved in, I haven't been able to really check out all the files by category to see what is in there.

I have received, I believe, only four votes to the Jim Peterson award via the Internet. But, am not worried yet, since most of us wait until the last minute, or deadline date before we act.

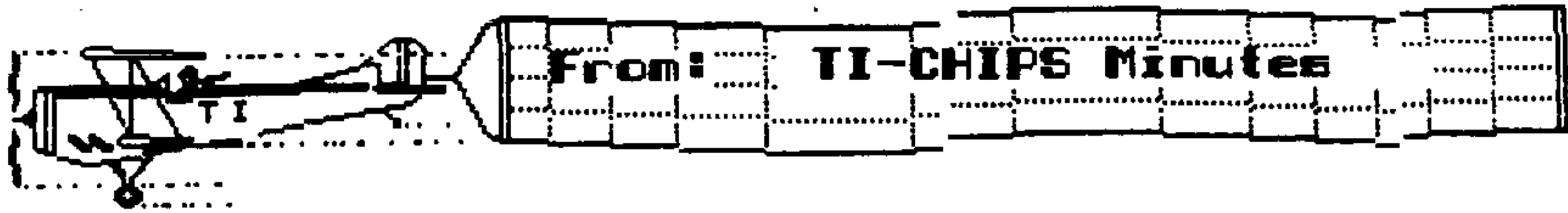
Jim Harris will be giving the demo at the March meeting. Hope to see you'all there.

Saint Patrick's Day

***** March 17th, 1996**

The February meeting of the TI-Chips was called to order by Fred Lalacci. At which time the Treasurer's, Membership and Disk Library reports were made.

Lin Shaw started the new year by carrying over the 1995 balance into the 1996 balance sheet. Lin had also prepared a separate accounting sheet for MUG'96. This sheet was copied and given to Les Kee to present to North Coast 99ers for their records.

John Parken reported that this is the interesting time of the year due to the relatively large number of membership renewals coming due. There are 4 memberships up for renewal in February/March period alone.

Les Kee brought in copies of the latest disk library update. Fred asked about how TI-Emulator works and if anybody had any experiences with this software. A lively discussion followed on what the emulator can / cannot do and how to operate the software. One of the points brought out was that some sections of TI-Emulator seem to operate independently of MS-DOS and/or Windows systems. This is because the routines are not able to be interrupted or stopped by any keyboard action or command. Yours truly stated that this was particularly true when the demo routine was run. The only way the demo could be stopped was a complete power-down of my Compaq notebook. This meant pulling the plug and popping out the battery! I said that I wouldn't install any software into my hard drive that I didn't feel I had control over. Fred asked if the TI-Emulator was available on 3 1/2" disks and how much would be charged? Les was unsure of what the charge would be for software copies in 3 1/2" disks and he said he would have a price available at the March meeting.

I presented the monthly report on the status of MUG'96 and the results of the February 10 preconference tour of the armory. Copies of the Task & Planning Schedule were distributed and sent to N.C. along with a MUG'96 Reservation Confirmation list. Three points of conference planning were discussed.

1. Ada Markus asked if there be a welcoming committee at the entrance of MUG'96 and who will be on it?

Ans.: Yes, there will be a registration/welcoming committee at the entrance to the MUG'96 and the make-up of the committee will be decided set-up night (May 24). (It was stated that all committees will have rotating membership so that nobody gets stuck doing the job all day long.)

2. What equipment will be needed and who will bring it?

Ans.: A list of equipment and volunteers was generated by the Chips. The list included 25 foot 14/16 ga extension cords, 6-outlet power strips, composite monitor(s), microphone (P.A. system), 100 cup coffee maker, "stand-by" Geneve system, signs, 30 gal garbage

bags, marking pens and video support equipment (including camera(s), tripod(s), cables, vcr, monitor and VHS tape). Any additions and/or offers from the North Coast 99ers will be most welcome.

3. Ada also inquired if there will be another article published about MUG'96?

Ans.: Yes! An article will be drafted and submitted to MICROpendium, Harry Hoffman (our newsletter) and posted on comp.sys.ti as well as TI.general BBS. This article will include the names of confirmed reservations for MUG'96 as of the date of publication/posting. Yours truly stated that we cannot assume that those who have attended the conferences at Lima can or will attend MUG'96.

Jim Krych reported that the JIM PETERSON ACHIEVEMENT AWARD rules and candidate list has been published. A short discussion followed as to the type of award to be presented and photographic documentation (pictures). The Chips decided on four 6 X 8 plaques with suitable inscriptions, and both polaroid and 35mm pictures will be taken of the presentation.

In relation to the Jim Peterson Achievement Award, I asked if anyone has come forward with a listing of Jim Peterson software. I stated that I found three cassette tapes containing his routines. I hoped that others will come forward with what they have.

Fred Lalacci said he attended the Peter Trapp show in Strongsville and had picked up a Cleveland Computer Society Directory. He wondered if we ever applied to have the TI-Chips included in this directory. John Parken said our initial attempts were not responded to. Fred said he would call the society and find out what, if any, are the requirements for inclusion.

Les Kee gave us a demo of a routine published in the November'95 issue of MICROpendium. This is a routine for the 99/4A that displays the dry bulb and wet bulb temperature and computes the percent relative humidity. The routine called "Tempcheck" was written by Loren West. Not only is this routine quick and easy to use, the demo worked perfectly the first time out!

Long time Tler, Ted Schillky, brought in his TI-99/4As as a donation to the TI-Chips to use as we saw fit. This included three consoles (two of which were BRAND NEW!), a PEB complete with two 5 1/4" drives (powered by a Corcomp controller) and a 260/520 mem card. We agreed to donate these systems to a church youth group that Jim Krych is affiliated with. Thank you Ted. Your generosity will long be remembered.

John Parken won the 50/50 raffle. Congratulations John!
