

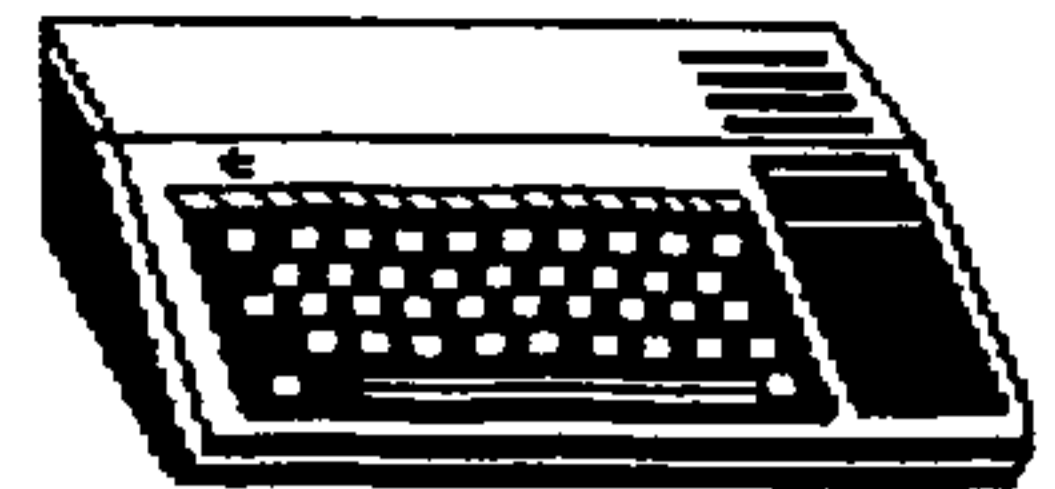

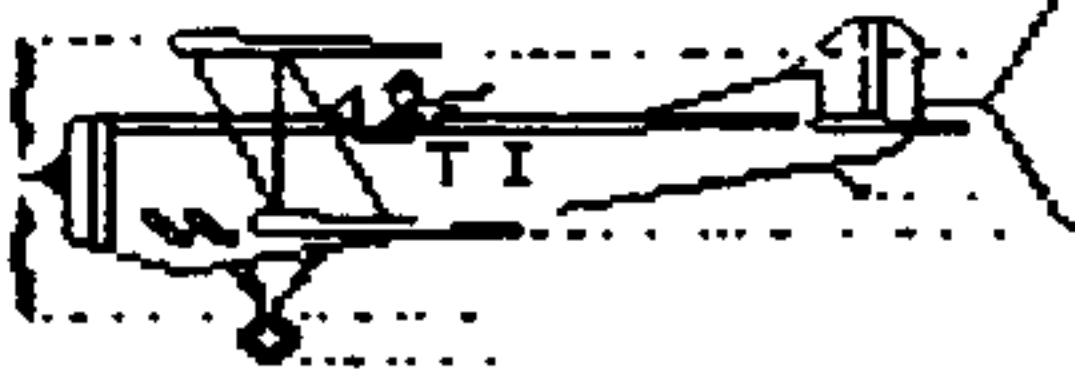

The March meeting of the TI-Chips was called to order by Fred Ialacci. Our Treasurer, Lin Shaw, reported that the Chips was still solvent in spite of the occasional withdrawals for MUG'96. Yours truly submitted a postage receipt covering MUG'96 reservation confirmations and self addressed postcards sent to confirnees to advise us what the subject of their presentation and time requirements. The response to the postcard mailing was reported to be good. Ascii versions of the postcard survey were also e-mailed to participants for who we have internet addresses.

John Parken reported that we had a 100% renewal in the big February - March membership renewal time period. John also reported that Texas Instruments sent him a letter inquiring if the TI-Chips was still active. John answered in the affirmative. John said that TI will provide us with a complete list of all active TI-99/4A user groups. This was an unexpected surprise. We can only wonder what the reason for TI's survey was/is. John also said he talked to a Steve Eggers (please forgive me if the last name is wrong) about a TI-99/8 system Steve owns. John said Steve was hanging on to his 99/8. We asked John if Steve could be persuaded to demo his 99/8 at MUG'96. This demo has been planned before, but never came to fruition. Maybe this time Tiers could have the opportunity to see the rare TI-99/8 in action. Right now, a time slot at MUG'96 could be reserved.

Don Walden (Cecure Electronics and the Milwaukee User Group) has made his reservations for MUG'96, and has said he will be bringing some new and exciting things for the TI.

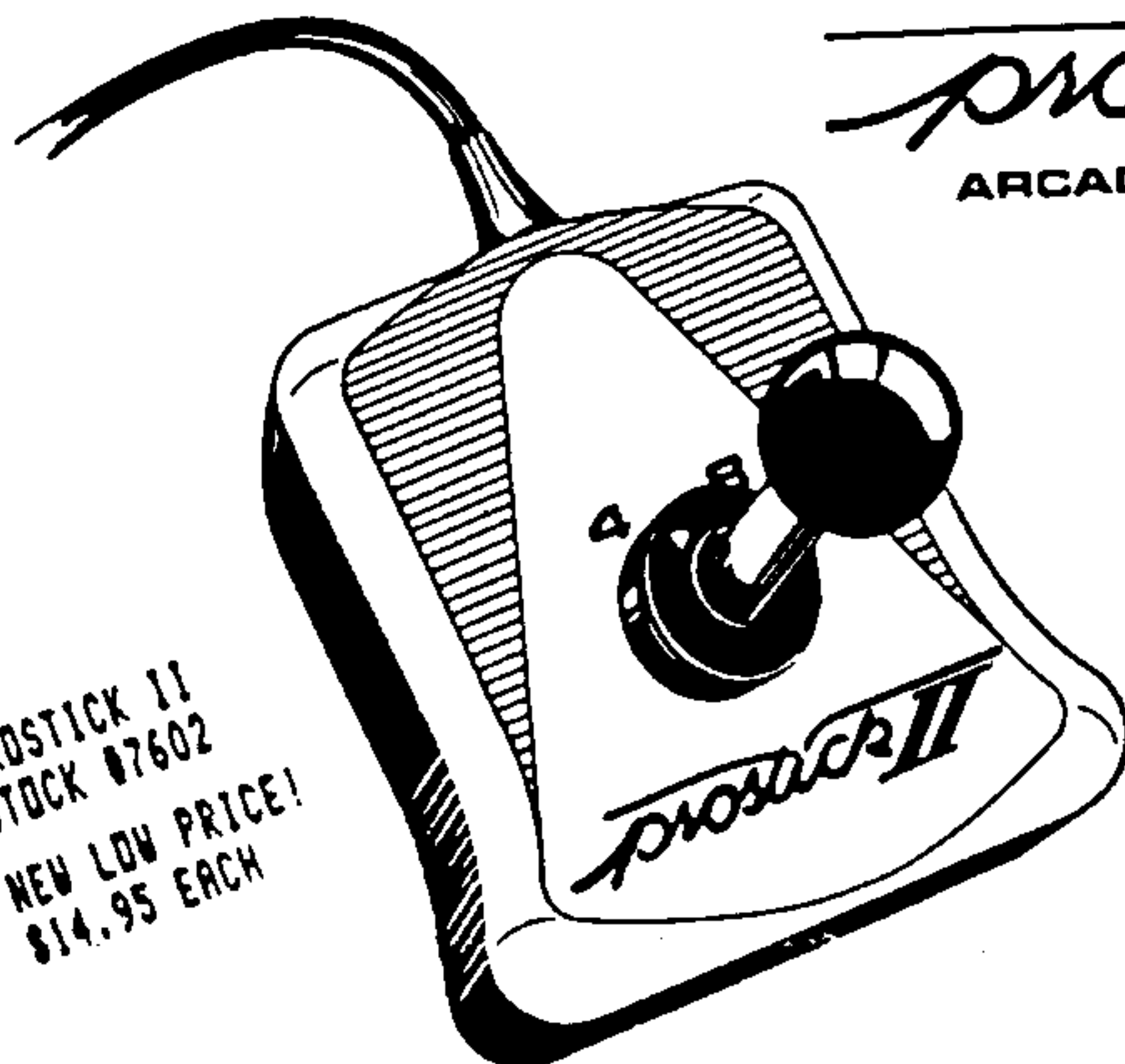

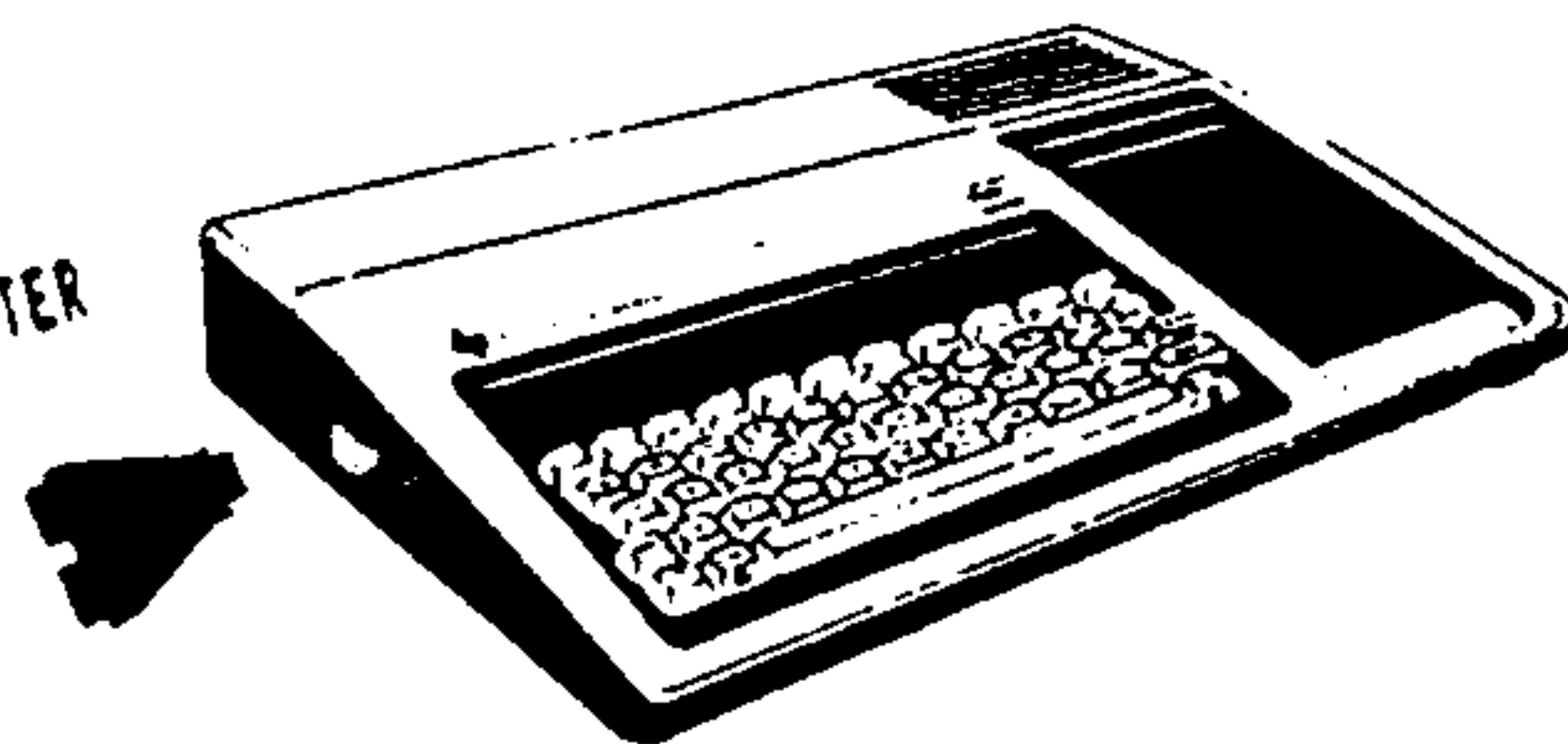

Subject: How to Mark Large Numbers of Msgs as having been Read

One of the nice features of Free-Net II is that, when you access an Email or an information area, it will always start you out with the first item that you have not yet read. The problem is that, because we just converted over to the new system, as far as the computer is concerned, there are over 24,000 files you haven't read--whether you previously saw them or not on the Version I system.

To correct this, we have instituted a feature called the "kill" command. This feature will allow you to mark ALL MESSAGES prior to a certain point as having been previously read. Here's all you need to do:

Let's say there are 298 messages in the Kiosk. You type in the number 298 (which takes you to the end of the pack) and you see you've read everything up and including message 290.

To mark all those previous messages, just select number 290 and read it (one last time). Then at the next prompt, where it says: Enter Command, type the letter "k"

If you were to then back out of the Kiosk (by typing "p" for previous menu), then come back in again, your Kiosk menu would have message #291 right in the middle of your screen. Everything prior to that would be marked with the letter "R" (meaning, Read), and everything after that would be unmarked and ready for your review.

Editor Note: This would also come in handy for trying a new/old bulletin board! You could skip through all the very OLD stuff. It's worth a try even if this is an old 1989 file.



# LIBRARY UPDATE

I have been adding the disk catalog to the disk description for some time now and it is always in capital letters. This helps in searching the library files for programs by using the FS option of TIWriter. Next month I will have a library disk which has the library files from 1991 to the present. This should help if you are looking for a particular program. You can either search each program with TIW or by using a disk editor and doing a disk search for a string if you aren't sure how old the file is. The library files are pretty much as you see in the newsletter without the lead paragraphs like this. Sometimes it is possible to search for key words like 'game' or 'recipe'.

Actually, the library doesn't get much use. I used to think that it would get more use if the disks were free and at the meeting but that doesn't work. The real reason I guess is that few people use their computers or that they only use them for familiar programs. I am also surprised how few members use modems. There is a lady who recently joined the Akron group and had never belonged to a User Group before. She had taught herself how to write programs and had written some very useful utilities for herself. She now has acquired a 300 baud modem, the kind where the telephone hand piece is placed on the modem, and is learning how to use the Akron Freenet. She is thrilled to see the words scrolling across her screen from another computer and she was ecstatic to find out how easy it is to send and receive e-mail. A computer can be a useful tool but it can also be a lot of FUN.....!!

See comments for 96001. STARTREK is an archived file of a Startrek game. TEXTFILES is an archived file of two humorous STARTREK stories in DV80 format. ARC304 is V3.04 of Archiver. I did not notice any advantage over V3.03. ARC/LOAD, ARC304, CONTENTS, G99, G99/LOAD, LOAD, LOADLOAD, MXDOS, STARS1, STARTREK, STRTRK1 P, STRTRK2 P, STRTRK3 P, TEXTFILES AND WELCOME P.

## DISK 95009: [ DS/SD ]

This is the C99 V 5.1 Compiler program and library files written by Clint Pulley and Winfried Winkler. Much of this is written in German but the program files work. A partial disk cat: C99-NOTIZ, CCOMP-DOC, CSUP80H1, EDITOR, FIRSTFILE, FLOAT2;C, FPRINTF, FSCANF, LASTFILE, PRINTF, PRSETA-1;C, PRTMAN-DOC, PRTMANAGER, SCANF, TEXT80-DOC, TEXT80;O, TIME, WINDOW;O, WRITEC;C.

## DISK 95010: [ DS/SD ]

More Internet News Group files which contain information on our computer, its history and reviews of some of the hardware and programs for it. Charles Good has written a number of articles on the TI laptop, the CC40, which can still be purchased for a reasonable price. ## DISK 95012: [ DS/SD ]

This is version 3.41 of Alexander Hulpke's XHI graphics program for the GENEVE. It produces extremely sharp graphics images. It is designed to be used in extended basic programs. Once you load the program it will stay in memory until the computer is turned off. The XH program can be written to load the program which is then available for XB commands to use the graphic capability. I included some sample programs, in addition to the demo programs which come with the XHI program, to show how this works. These programs came from the CHICAGO TIMES newsletter in a review of XHI. The files are: CHARA1, CLOCK, COLDEF, FIXSTERNE, HARDCOPY, HCLoad, HCSETUP, HIDEM, HIRESDemo, KUGEL, KUGEL-LOAD, KUGEL;PAR, KUGEL;PIC, LOAD, MICE, PLANE, READ\*ME, TOMYART, X80-ARK, X8ODOC, XHI, XHI-ARTLES, XHI-GRAF6, XHI-GRAF7, XHI/S, XHIDOC, XHIFILSCR, XHIMOTION, YLOAD.

## DISK 95013: [ DS/SD ]

PORT95 is a program I have been waiting for since I saw it demoed at Lima last year. It was written by Tim Tesch and is for the Geneve. I have not had a chance to try it yet but the demo was terrific. It is still in the Beta stage but is available for anyone who wishes to try it and comment on it. It solves some of the problems with TELCO because of the modernization of the BBS's past TELCO's abilitys. It will (when finished) handle ANSI colors, High speed modems, flow control and a number of other features. I downloaded the program from the Indiana Hoosier UG (HUG) and while I was at it I got the listing of the files in the BBS directory, in files IND-A and IND-B. There is another file, IND-TIBBS giving the phone number and how to sign on.

## DISK 95014: [ DS/SD ]

This is a disk for those of you who work with modems, Internet and BBS's. If you wish to attach a program file to a text file in an Internet message you will find that the Internet mail system will not accept it because programs are classed as binary files. This means they contain ASCII characters higher than 127 and Internet will filter these. The way to get around this is to "UNENCODE" the program file so that it is in a DV/80 format and the "UNENCODE" this file at the receiving end. The programs on this disk will do that. Also on this disk is TIBBS, a list of TI BBS's around the country. TI-UG is a list of user groups. YMODEM/ARC is an improved YMODEM file for TELCO written by Barry Boone.

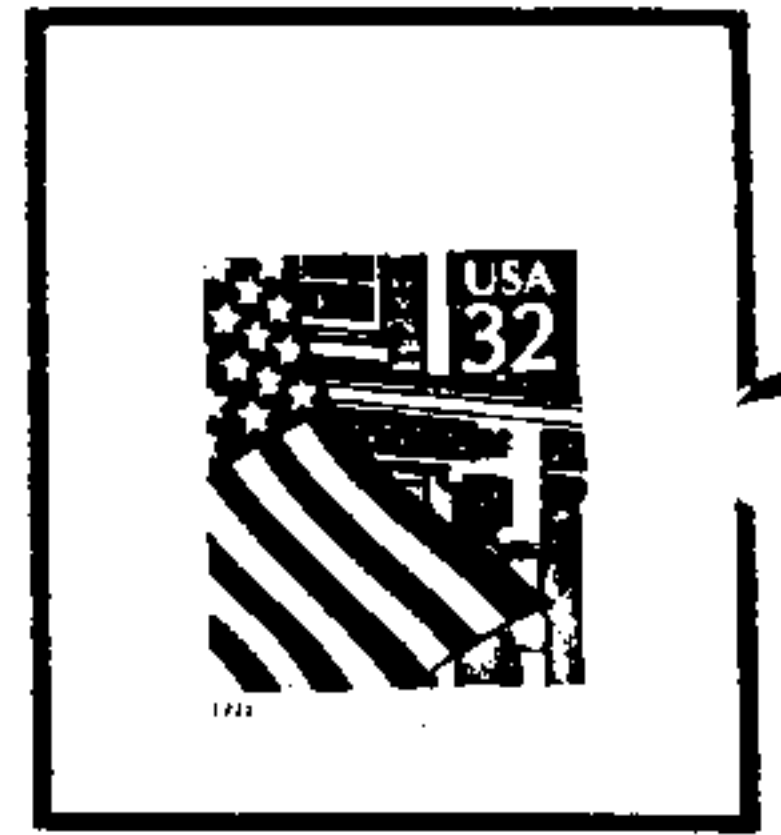
## DISK 95015:

DISKMGR is a Beery Miller program written some time ago. BATCH is actually an autoexec program with a menu. WHATS will work from MDOS as a handy calculator. Type in WHATS 2+2 and you will get the answer. It works with all the standard TI math notations. SHOWDATE, when entered in MDOS will do what it says. There are also some other MDOS commands to play with.

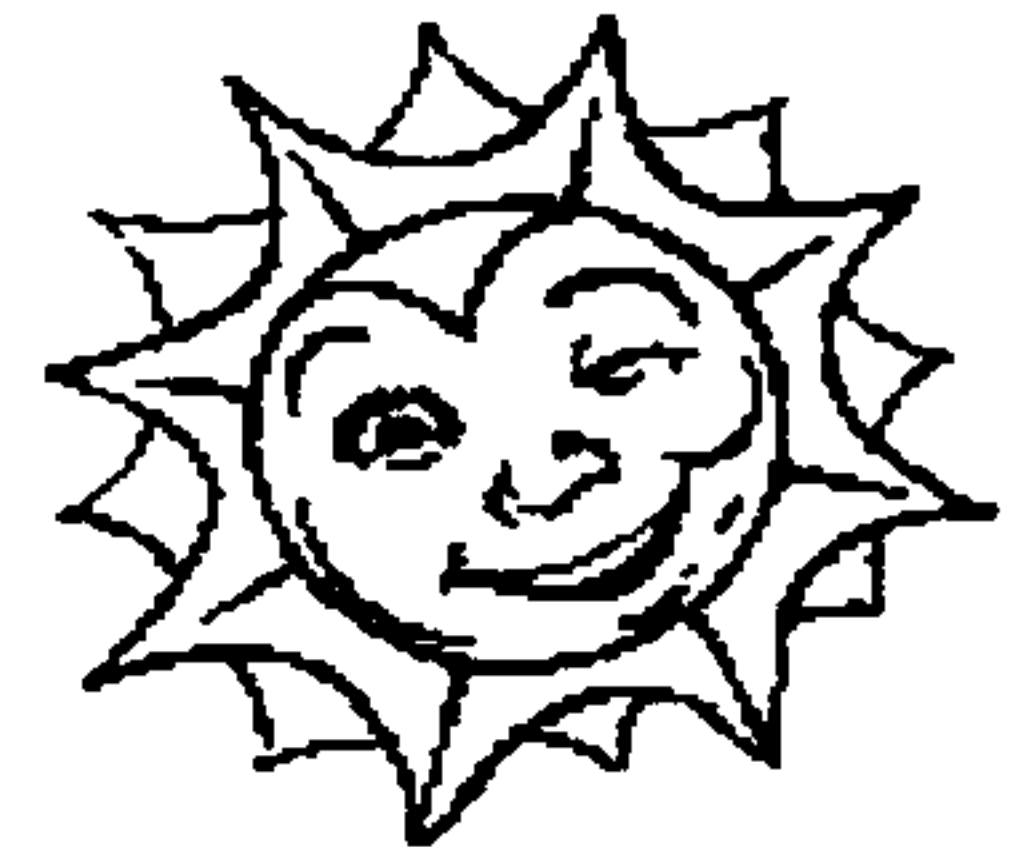
