Minutes:

We had a small but active meeting. There was a demonstration of six different programs from the clubs library, followed by a lot of discussion-in fact the doors didn't get closed until 11:00. We would like to welcome our new members who have joined this past month.

Disk Drives and Printers:

Thanks to Central Iowa Users Group for the initial information. American Design Components (1-800 524 0809) has several hundred stand alone TI disk drives and disk controllers for only \$99.00. A major draw back is that they do not include the disk manager module. However if you are adding a second disk drive this is no problem. But if this is to be your only disk drive you must have the disk manager module (unless you have a VERY close friend who will initialize all your disks for you.) After a lot of detective work on Jeani's and my part, we have found you can call 1-800 TI CARES (1-800 842 2737) and tell them you need a disk module. Their policy is not to sell the module (\$14.95) unless you have tried the retail outlets (hint, Tenix, Triton and Unisourse do not have any). If they tell you they can not sell you one, ask to speak to their supervisor.

Several of our members found about this bargain at the January meeting and have already received theirs. ~~American Design also has TI thermal printers for only \$24.95.~~ Again, you will have to call TI to order paper or you can purchase it from Jeani at the meeting. According to American Design Components, these are sold As Is, however they told one person that if they arrived damaged they would replace them and TI told us they would repair them, because they want their customers to be satisfied.

Both printer and disk drive are sent without manuals. To solve this we will have copies of manuals at the meeting, so you can make copies on the copy machine (10 cents per page).

Both TI and Design Components take Visa and Master Charge.

Newsletter Exchange Policy:

As in the past we will continue to exchange newsletters with selected users groups. However, to save unnecessary printing expence, we will no longer include reprints of Tigercub Hints (unless requested to do so by any specific group) in these exchange copies. It dosen't make sence to pay to send something they already get FREE direct from Jim Peterson. I suggest other groups consider this same policy. Raffle Revisited:

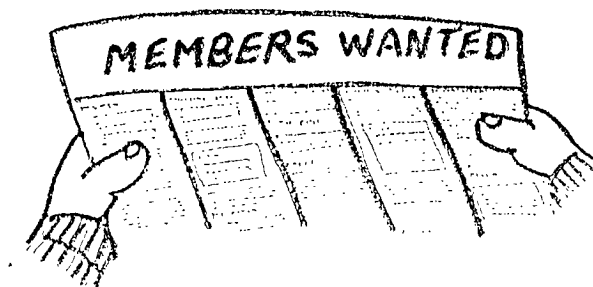

JEANI'S JABBERINGS

Now that many of you have printers, I thought I would show you a simple but effective way to put them to work. List making, is something I do a lot of. I was always going to write a simple program to make lists for me, but I have never gotten around to it. In the mean time, I have discovered how to put the computer to the task of organizing lists without a program. Actually, your list is the program. Using this method to construct lists, you can utilize all those great editing features of the T.I. 99/4A. You don't need any special programming skills. You don't need a special module like extended basic. All you need is your computer. Of course, if you want to save your lists, you will need a cassette recorder or a disk drive, and if you want to print your list, you need a printer. The T.I. Thermal Printer is ideal for this, but you can also use any other printer that connects to your computer.

The sample program is for a grocery list. The format is set up for Big John's Food King in Hanford, where I shop. If your store has merchandise arranged in a different order, you can change the line numbers.

- A. To make your basic grocery list:
 1. Type in the following program in BASIC. (If you have Extended BASIC, you may substitute the word REM with an exclamation point "!").
 2. Add to the program list any food items you buy regularly, using the following procedure.
 - a. Decide in what section that food product is found, in the store.
 - b. Type a line number within the range for that section. (Do not use the same line number more than once)
 - c. Type REM (! if using XBASIC) and hit the space bar.
 - d. Type the name of the item and quantity (i.e. PAPER PRODUCTS (610-699) Your line would read 620 REM NAPKINS,300 YELLOW
 - e. Press ENTER
 3. After you have added all regular purchases, save the program to a disk or tape.
- B. To make your weekly grocery list:
 1. Load your basic grocery list into the computer
 2. Add this weeks purchases to the list in the same manner you did for the basic list.
 3. To delete an item from the list, type the item's line number and press ENTER.
 4. To change information on a line:
 - a. Type the line number of the item.
 - b. Hold the function key down and press "E" (the up arrow)
 - c. Use the editing keys (INS,DEL,ERASE) or just retype the line.

- d. When the line is the way you want it, press ENTER
- C. To view your lists on the screen, in proper order:
 1. Type LIST and press ENTER
 2. If you want to stop the list from scrolling up the screen, hold down the function key and press the #4 key. To continue scrolling, type CON and press ENTER
 3. If you want to look at only a section of your list, include the line number range for that section (i.e. LIST 610-699).
 4. If you want a print out of your list to take to the store with you, type LIST"TP" (for other printers use LIST"PIO" or LIST"RS232" depending on the port your printer uses).

Try this program list, even if you aren't going to the store. Before you know it you will have become proficient in the use of your computer's editing capabilities. You will learn the orderliness of program line numbers. Best of all, you will be using your computer and printer to help around the house. After all, isn't that what you bought it for?

At the last meeting, some members were asking about new and used computers for backups for their systems. I told them I have new computers for \$125.00 and one used computer for \$75.00. I have decided to make these available to club members only, for \$99.00 new and \$65.00 used. See me if you want one.

If you recently purchased a disk drive and thermal printer, you may find you have too many plugs for your wall outlet. Don't use an extension cord and plug some units into another outlet - You could damage your equipment. Instead, use a gang outlet, one with a fuse and a switch on it. Plug all your equipment (computer, T.V., disk controller, disk drive, printer, tape recorder) into it. Turn all the switches to the "ON" position, except the computer and the gang switch. Plug the gang cord into the wall outlet. Now, turn on the gang switch and then the computer switch. Always turn the computer on last. I can get you a good gang plug with 6 outlets for \$23.95, but if you watch your sales, K-Mart sometimes has them for under \$10.00. If you want surge protection also, I can get you the same gang outlet with surge suppressor for only \$39.95 (cheap insurance). You won't find these at K-Mart.

DISKETTES AND STORAGE: Now that you have a disk drive, you will need some diskettes and something to keep them in. I will have some initialized diskettes for sale at the next meeting. Also, one of our members, Richard Butts, has learned about a company that will sell our club members diskettes at an incredibly low price. We will have to make a group purchase of fifty diskettes, so come prepared to place your order and save on diskettes. I will also have some storage units available: MOLULE AND CASSETTE CASE \$19.95, FLIP TOP DISK CASE (holds 50)..\$19.95, FLIP N FILE/10 (holds 10)..5.95, FLIP N FILE/15 (holds 15)..\$9.95, FLIP N FILE/25..(holds 25)..\$19.95, FLIP N FILE/50 (holds 50)..\$29.95, DATA CASE (holds 50)..\$14.95, and DISK DRAWER (fits into your file drawer like a hanging file...holds 60)..\$19.95. These are all sturdy units made by INNOVATIVE CONCEPTS the leading name in disk storage.

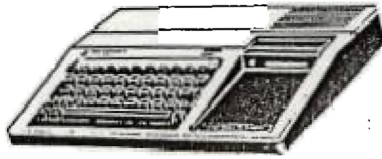
