ME? USE THE COMPUTER?

Since the TI computer first arrived in our home, it has grown to occupy more and more space and more and more of the time of other members of the family. I am a housewife and mother and part-time teacher of small groups of foreign students. My friends often ask me how I can stand having all that "stuff" cluttering up my home. They are astonished to learn that I consider it to be one of the best labor-saving devices since the dishwasher, and that far from resenting its intrusion into my life, I am one of its most devoted fans. I don't program it, I don't use the modem, and I don't have much time for games. But the TI-Writer has enabled me to do many things much faster than I did them before and have a lot more fun in the process.

As a teacher, I prepare lesson materials, save them

to disk, and print as many copies as needed for each new class. I am a terrible typist, but now my handouts look beautiful because all the typos are corrected before they are printed. The Text Formatter centers the titles, underlines, fixes margins, and accomplishes dozens of other tasks which consume so much extra time and effort on a regular typewriter. I hate making carbon copies; now I tell the Formatter how many copies I want and go have lunch while it makes them for me.


As a housewife and mother, I have found more and more uses for TI-Writer. Last Christmas it printed all the Christmas letters and addressed all the envelopes for me and for my mother. When my sons want help studying for an exam, I make a sample test and print as many copies as there are kids who need them. I write to my friends on the computer, and they are delighted to

receive prompt, lengthy replies to their letters. If I don't finish a letter, I save it to disk and finish it later. My grandfather wrote out a book of his memoirs by hand; I copied it and printed out copies for relatives who wanted it.

My husband and I no longer have to help the kids type up school reports and term papers; they do it themselves on the computer. If a page gets smudged at the last minute, it's easy enough to make another copy. There are dozens of other ways in which this friendly little word processor can help you.

TI-Writer has one of the most clearly written instruction manuals I have ever seen. Its commands are simple and logical, making them easy to remember (SF for Save File; LF for Load File, etc.). The manual includes step-by-step lessons and a quick reference guide to refresh the memory later.

If you or some members of your family are not using the computer, try letting TI-Writer make your life a little easier!
