We have received word from various sources that CorComp (even though filing for Chap 11) has absolutely no intention of going out of business. They are merely re-grouping to better meet the marketplace. Rumor has it that the 9900 Micro Expansion System from CorComp may be available by the time you read this. We all hope so. CorComp, we plan to continue your support!

In the early days of the CorComp double density controller card, it was said that it was not compatible with the Foundation 128K memory card. This was verified by one of our members. CorComp has perfected a fix in the form of a new ROM which they will send for the asking. This ROM is also supposed to make the DDDC work with ALL consoles.

I have had the chance to read many newsletters from other groups this past month. It is always good to see what is happening elsewhere on the TI scene. Several of the newsletters complained that a TI users' group in Arizona which had been freely exchanging newsletters, started charging \$13 per year for a subscription. I always thought that users' groups were supposed to share information with each other for the common betterment.

One other comment from other newsletters is one from HCM. HCM seems to think that these groups are making derogatory remarks about their magazine. The FORTH SIG met and had another interesting meeting swapping information and techniques. At this meeting the CorComp Cursor (newsletter) was shown. In this publication, they gave information on how to convert TI FORTH to run on any available disk format including SSDD, DSSD and DSDD. I personally tried this and was 100 percent successful--even with the FORMAT-DISK word. It appears that CorComp really knows what they are doing with FORTH. Also, I was able to BSAVE and BLOAD my personalized version of DSDD FORTH by following Craig Miller's instructions from a few newsletters back.

We have received a nice gift recently--an assembly language screen dump for TI/Epson/Gemini printers which is loadable/callable from XB. This is nice in itself, but the nicest part is that language which was contained in the header to the source code (Yes we got the source also). The header said, "Program released into the public domain Sept 1984. This program not to be sold!! Anyone who wishes may have it free." This very generous gift and very generous statement came from assembly language wizard Danny Michael who lives in Florence, Alabama. It is really nice to run across such a generous, selfless person as he. We

should have more. Thanks, Danny.

The much-heralded Version III of STARTEXT is scheduled to debut on November 26. This version promises to have many improvements. I am looking forward to using it then. All new subscribers will have to pay a rate of \$9.95 per month. This flat rate is still a super bargain--especially when compared to Comuserve or Source. ST was nice and gave all current subscribers a chance to extend their subscriptions up to 1 year at the old rates. We are fortunate to have such a good videotext service available locally at such reasonable rates.

Hello fellow 99ers this is James Crosson and this is my first and maybe last time I write an article for the 99er letter, depending on how badly I do this time. What I am writing to you about is a problem I have been having for sometime and didn't know what to do about it or who to see. The problem is mystery fingerprints on a good many of my disks and how to get them off. Up until now I was cleaning my disks with alcohol and lintfree cloth, but this didn't work so good since this usually just spread the oil from the fingerprint and made the area larger and left a stain, that to me looked very suspicious. This is when I decided to talk to someone that was very worldly about these things, Gerry Myers(our head librarian). He suggested that I try a good product known as "Bestine". The only place I could find this is a art supply such as Azle Art Supply. It worked very good and didn't even leave a stain. Oh, by the way use a cotton swab it does very nice. However, this still didn't solve all the problems with the disks. I kept using a Quick Test from Disk Manager 2, and it would

still say I had an error, and just by chance I stumbled on the answer sometimes the catalog line remembers that a error was recorded on its sectors. By reinitializing the disk it removed its memory and the disk would read free of errors. However, you also have to remember that this erases everthing else on the disk.

Nov. 3, 1984

President Leroy Thompson called the meeting to order, and minutes from last meeting were accepted. Treasurer Charles Bathman gave a financial report and reported that the club had a net \$262.48 in its account.

Bathman also announced that BASIC classes probably would start this month for anyone interested. He also requested that these classes be limited to anyone 16 years old and

older.

Bathman, for the benefit on many new members who are now just becoming acquainted with their 99/4A, explained the many facets of the computer and how to expand it. Following a short break, Franklin Vest gave a demonstration of OSCAR, the bar code program reader.

The rumors we've heard about someone taking over production of TI's EXTENDED BASIC have finally been verified. Exceltec, Incorporated of Lubbock, Texas has the "Cheese". We received a short letter from Charles H. Roberts, president of Exceltec, advising us that they would be producing EXTENDED BASIC using TI parts. Exceltec is quoting a group purchase price of \$79.95 for five or more modules. I personally feel that price is too high, since B J Sales (AKA Bob Wallace) is currently selling TI Extended Basic for \$85.00. In the future, Bob hopes to be able to get Exceltec's Extended Basic at a lower price.

One of the books that many members have been anxiously awaiting, Amlist's BASIC "Tips", has finally been ordered and should be available at the next meeting. There will be a little surprise package with each book along with a surprise reduced price of \$11.50. This is a very good self-tutorial book on TI Basic and includes many excellent examples of TI Basic routines. Incidentally, Amlist, as a business, is no longer in the third party TI market. After many phone calls, I found out that TEX+COMP is now the primary supplier for this publication.

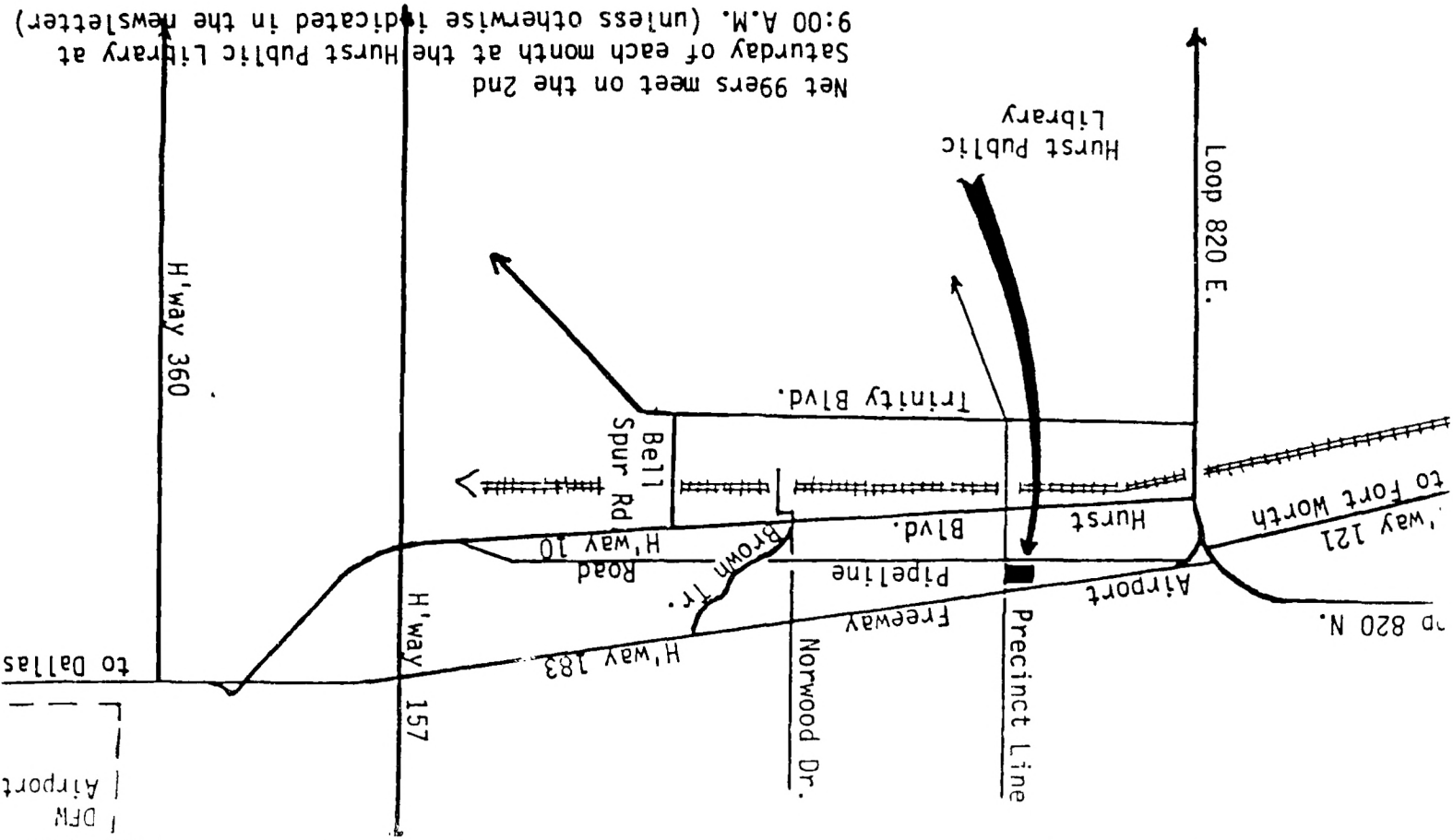

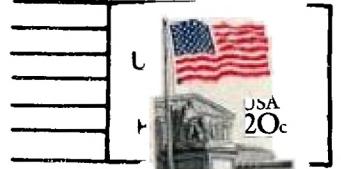
