I received my user manual and password into TIMELINES last week and and have been happily wending my way through a humongous database every 4th day since. Like its predecessor (UMBBS), TIMELINES is a national board accessible through Datapac from nearly everywhere in Canada with only a local call involved (Arnprior and only a couple of others excepted!).

Unlike UMBBS this one isn't free. TIMELINES picks up the tab for the Datapac line you're using but you pay them the one-time joiners fee of \$15 and 7 cents a minute for your time on line (10 cents per if 1200 baud).

If you can ration your time wisely (unlike me) this may be the year's best buy (I spent 146 minutes on the system on my first call!!!) The rumor mill says its going to very soon become heavily TI oriented too! Three of the groups currently belonging to the National Users Association already have representation there. We have been offered the opportunity to have a block of the system allocated for our TI-99/4A National User's Association and will likely avail ourselves of the opportunity to do so. One of the more exciting features this will allow is the ability to hold real-time tele-conferences amongst as many as twelve users at once! There are interactive games on line; many special-interest boards; "chat" (for one-on-one comms) and much,

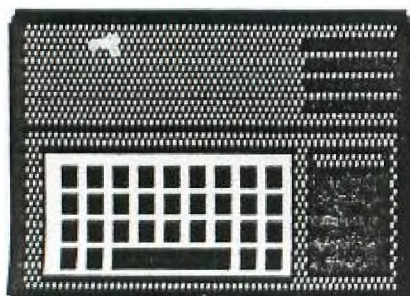

BERRY'S BYTES

I have been asked by several people to do reviews of the new crop of magazines which have sprung up to fill the gap left by the established magazines like Home Computer Magazine which used to be the 99er or Compute!

Compute has always printed programs for unexpanded users only and Home Computer has eliminated all of its advanced coverage such as Assembly or Multiplan.

The first one into the breach was Craig Miller with his Smart Programmer. This began as supplements to his book on sprites. In Feb. 1984 he decided to turn it into a monthly. Unfortunately, the pressure of other work has prevented him from keeping a regular schedule. However, when it does appear it is well worth the wait. It covers Assembly programs especially those called from Extended BASIC and also has a series of memory maps and a Forth Column. There is no advertising and each issue is 16 pages printed on heavy coloured stock. Subscriptions are by sending \$16 US to Millers Graphics, 1475 W. Cypress Ave., San Mini-Memory Dimas, CA USA 91773.

Shortly after Miller's supplements began to appear another magazine was launched. In fact the first issue also appeared in Feb. 1984. This was the now famous Micropendium (originally known as Home Computer Compendium). This aims to be an all around magazine with reviews, short programs, tips, freeware and user group info. It also carries lots of advertising. It has now grown to 48 pages in size and is printed on newsprint. It is the best rounded of the crop and has maintained a regular schedule. Subscriptions are \$18.50 US and are available by writing to: Micropendium, P.O. Box 1343, Round Rock, TX USA 78680.

Another magazine I just became aware of is Super 99 Monthly which by counting back started around Sept. 1984. I only saw this one in March 85 and that was issue #7. It aims to cover all topics which might be of interest to users at all levels. Recent issues have columns on BASIC, Forth, Multiplan, Assembly, Hardware, Speech and TI-Writer. It is printed on paper similiar to the Smart Programmer and the issues I have seen looked very good. It is 12 pages long and the subscriptions are \$16 US (\$26.50 by air). They are available from Bytemaster Computer Services, 171 Mustang St., Sulphur, LA USA 70663.

In my opinion they are all worthy of support and would encourage all our readers to subscribe to at least one of them. I very recently heard of a new one called Mini Mag 99, but I have only seen one issue and it is too soon to make any judgement on it. Anyone who is interested can call me for further details.

TI-ARTIST AN ELECTRONIC SKETCHPAD

OVERVIEW

TI-ARTIST is written by Chris Faherty, who has authored a number of other TI programs. It is similar to Koala Pad for the Apple or Commodore 64. The program makes very good use of the TI-99/4A bit-map graphics. Except for the Extended Basic loader, it is written entirely in assembly language and requires the following:

- TI-99/4A console.
- 32k memory expansion.
- TI disk memory system.
- Joystick is optional but highly recommended.
- Extended Basic module, or Editor/Assembler, or Mini-Memory, or TI-WRITER, or even the Corcomp Manager.

The program loads easily and quickly. Thus, you can start drawing very nice graphics right from the beginning !!!

ENTERING THE COMMANDS

Its unique menu selection technique features a picture oriented function selector that is extremely easy to use and understand. Press the SPACE BAR to toggle from the sketch area to the main menu and vice-versa. Once you become familiar with the commands, you can use the handy single key strokes from the sketch area.

CREATING A PICTURE WITH TI-ARTIST

Go to the sketch area and let your creativity go wild !!! Of course, you have free-hand drawing, circle, box, connect-line (k-line) and an array of other commands. The mirror can also produce breath-taking effects. The zoom magnifies part of your graphic picture, thus permitting detailed examination and fine tuning. There are several brush styles, too. When using the FILL command you can choose different patterns to make your creation more lively. You can also brighten your picture with an easy to use color palette.

STORING AND PRINTING YOUR PICTURES

Pictures can be saved or loaded from disk with the STORE command. By the way, included on the diskette is a program called CONVERSIONS, this program allows you to convert pictures from different sources like DRAW-A-BIT and DRAW 'N PLOT !!! To permit producing hard copy, the picture can be sent to a printer in 4 different formats with a high speed screen dump.

EXTERNAL DSR

Load External DSR (Device Service Routine) is a function that I had never seen before. It allows you to use different drawing tools, like a touch pad, or an analog joystick. They even show you how to program your DSR.

DOCUMENTATION

Documentation is included on the disk and there's a little program to print it out for those who don't have TI-WRITER or Editor/Assembler. I wish the instructions were more detailed in some areas, like erase or swap. Overall, they're adequate and the author didn't forget any functions.

CONCLUSION

TI-ARTIST is a very good program that opens the door to more advanced graphics on our little orphan. You can obtain more information on TI-ARTIST from:

Many new and exciting things have happened to TI and the Ottawa TIUG over the summer. Bruce Caron's DM-1000 has put us on the international map as a real force in the TI community abroad. Many of you are by now aware of the fact that the group purchased the source code from Bruce last month and has since released the program under the 'Freeware' concept used by many powerful programmers in the TI world right now. Terry Atkinson (TINS) very kindly posted the package to The Source and Compuserve on our behalf. Donations for the program are already being received from all over North America. As of this writing the group has only just recouped its initial expenditure but considering the power of the program we have every reason to expect that as it goes farther afield we should expect substantial \$\$\$!

Ralph Romans of Carleton Place, treasurer of the Carleton TIUG, and soon-to-be member of the OUG too, has volunteered to caretake the program for us...making additions and corrections as required. In that regard....

Bill Byrne of the TIUG in Wichita Kansas was one of many people kind enough to respond with a donation to the group for DM-1000. Bill is also a co-owner of a company called MBP. His company produces a kit with a Clock and 8 channel A/D converter for the TI-99/4A. The utility of the clock can readily be seen but not so obvious is the power of the Analog/Digital converter ports. These can be used to interface with the real world:

Your TI could: monitor and control the temperature in your home!!!

with a
light-sensitive device.
control a sophisticated security system.....

Believe me...the list is only limited by your imagination!! Software to put up a Weather Station and Security System has been written already. The kit is available now in three formats and some software is included with each format. You can buy the PC board with parts list for \$41.50 US; the board with parts for \$83 US or the fully assembled and tested product for \$140 US. Shipping is included in the aforementioned prices.

Anyway; my reasons for mentioning this product in this article are twofold. Bill has sent us an assembly language source file that will allow DM-1000 to interface with the clock/calendar features of his board so that the user will then be able to catalog disks to his printer complete with date and time of listing. Also...if we sell as few as 5 kits for him with this ad, he will send a complimentary board to the OUG for inclusion on our BBS system....so for heaven's sake if you order a kit, as I think I may, mention me or the OUG newsletter as the promoter. We already have our own clock but the 8 channel A/D converter. I'll go on record here as being willing to co-ordinate a bulk purchase and even do the kit-assembling for those less technically inclined amongst us for an additional \$30/kit CDN. Polaroids of the finished product will be at the September meeting if you are interested and Bill's literature on the MBP card as well.

For the benefit of all new members in the group a quarterly update of DUG library software will be published in this newsletter. March, June, October and December will be the issues to watch for.

The really exciting news is the fact that the group is going to underwrite the production of a comprehensive catalog of all of my Public Domain software early in the fall. It will be a biggy...I estimate about 40 pages(so far!). It'll be on sale at General meetings and, on request, through the mail. The price will be our cost, rounded up to the nearest dollar plus any postage involved(if applicable). Once the catalog is out any member, either of our group or the National Association may request that a particular disk be immediately put into the group's library and available by the next meeting or mailed to you at your cost. This is the quickest way we could think of to get you the software you want rather than have you wait for me to include it sometime down the road.

Current best estimates place our cost of producing the catalog at just under \$2. Diskettes will continue to cost \$5 and cassettes \$4 at the meetings. A surcharge of \$1/disk or cassette will apply if a mailer and postage apply. Watch for the catalog at or before our October general meeting. Updates to this catalog will be published as a pull-out section of the newsletter.

Also new in the fall; starting in September; there'll be a question suggestion box present at every general meeting accessible to all. It is hoped we can use it as a tool to help you communicate your wishes to us. All serious questions/suggestions will be responded to at or before the next general meeting. Anonymity will be maintained if requested.
