THE PRESIDENT SAYS

Well, the convention was a complete success. Thank you for your help one and all. As most of you know, I am a consumer of computer products. So what did I buy? Well, Rave 99 had a board that plugs into the box for the speech synthesizer for \$49.95. It's a good deal because it will work with the Geneve also. I don't think the triple tech will, and it has a redundant clock on it that will not be used on the Geneve, nor will the printer buffer for that matter. I also got a bingo game that calls out the numbers by voice twice. It looks very good, running in extended basic. For information and price, contact Bob Chase 421 NW 69th St. Vancouver, Wa. 98665. Telephone 206-695-7002. Nicely done, Bob!

For those who have the CC40 compact computer, I just took two HM6116LP-4 chips out of it, and replaced them with HM6264LP-15 ones. This makes the little computer come up with 18K of memory. If you have a solder sucker, and a low power iron, and some guts, you can do this. First turn it on and type FRE(0). This will give you the amount of free memory. You will do this after the modification also. Mine read 18030 afterwards.

You must remove the back, remove the batteries, remove 11 screws from the mother board, and carefully lift both boards out of the case with the keys downward (careful they can fall out, and are a mess to put back) At the bottom of the board are the two chips. Don't touch the other ones above. They are smaller than the ones you will install, so the holes at the end of the chip will have to be cleared also. On the left of the chips are two option straps. You must move one end of these to the other solder hole. The other end of the strap is the same connection. If you would like the paper work with diagrams, send me \$1.00 and I will ship you the information. Chuck Wynne 16223 70th Place West, Edmonds, Wa. 98020.

Another product that looks good is the Artist Enlarger by Asgard Software. I saw it demoed after the show. Looks like a good product for increasing the size of your instances. It will also reduce them, but you may lose clarity in doing so.

Another product out there that maybe no one knows its purpose is Quick Copy from Quality Soft. This is a disk

optimizer. If you have a disk with over 30 files on it, you copy it over to a new disk with this. The copier will put all the information needed to get any file at the first of the disk (the file descriptor). Then watch the difference when you load a file, or catalog the disk. The drive runs smooth with no jumping.

The 9640 disk operating system is here now (DOS). It looks very good. Just like the IBM DOS (if you've ever used that.). Talking with Barry Traver, I found that most of the big name programmers with the 99/4A have a Geneve. This is good, because if they didn't the computer would not have the support it deserves. The more people that have it the better. MyDraw was awesome at the convention. Extremely fast an flexible. That comes with mouse for around \$100 at the present time.

I will continue to support the basic TI99/4A. It seems as though some are upgrading and leaning away from the basic computer. Remember, those who don't want to upgrade are out there too.

By logging on to COMPUSERVE with a 300/1200/2400 Baud Modem, the available of on-the-spot contact with members of the TI99/4A community throughout the country and nationally, makes this concept easily accessible to those needing up-to-date, on-the-spot information and help at a touch of your keyboard, telephone and modem. Relatively inexpensive,

this avenue of telecommunications allows the user to have his questions answered, share his knowledge with others, and most importantly help him to realize the benefits derived from this mode of getting what you need from the comfort of your own home.

GENie, Scott Darling, SYSOP, from Spokane, Wa., another of many telecommunication services available to our computer, was on hand to demonstrate the GENie service, explain how it works and the cost involved.

ASGARD SOFTWARE, Chris Bobbitt, in Rockville, Maryland, Chris in association with Richard Roseen of AEI, Inc. are developing a multi-tasking DOS system for the Geneve 9640, and Chris was asked questions pertaining to this. Projected release dates, etc. will be viewed on the Video which was produced by Miller Communications, Dave Miller of West Seattle, Washington. Chris, a very enlightening young author/producer/developer of his own software distribution business, dates back to the early years after the crash of the software support notices by Texas Instruments. Chris, not then near the age of 21, compiled and made available to the TI99/4A owner/user, his software packages through magazine and catalog ordering advertising. Today, there are many areas of the U.S. where User Groups are not formed. Were it not for the catalog and magazine order avenue of shopping, the TI99/4A user would not be in contact with the most up-to-date software releases. Chris continues to support not only the User Groups and mailorder customers, but he stands behind his product, and continually updates his software inventory. His close association with programmers desiring to sell their wares, keep ASGARD in the know of what is wanted and needed by the TI99/4A community. The exciting factor here is that MOST if not all of his Software packages run on both the TI99/4A and the Geneve 9640. His distribution of the red book, TI99/4A INTERN is a popular item. The Mechatronic Mouse with software, the Extended Basic by Mechatronics and the Gram Card are other items that were on display. The announcement of 80 column Multiplan was also noted. The use of an 80 col. RGB monitor gave many the incentive to expand for easier word processing and spread-sheet capabilities.

QUEEN ANNE COMPUTER SHOPPE, Seattle, Washington is owned and operated by Ms. Barbara Wiederhold. Starting in October, 1983 and continuing on with the idea that there are a great many computer owners STILL NEEDING individualized help, continues to maintain that premise. The shoppe is open Monday through Sat. Customers call from all over the State, cut-of-state and into Canada. With the expertise and programming ability of Tom Wynne, a local TI99/4A assembly and C language student, using his talents to produce the software, this is a NEW ITEM TO WATCH FOR.

NAMELOC, Paul Coleman from Portland, Oregon, a new dealer to our Convention list. With his participation into our activities, bring more software and hardware items, only enhanced the chances of the TI99/4A public to buy. Paul is new to us, but hopefully not to the Portland, Oregon area where DEALERS are in demand.

TI-RECYCLE-ABLES, Bob Amman, was on hand to SELL HIS WARES. He continues to reinforce the NEED to let us know that many times we PERSONALLY have things to clear out of our inventory. Bob owns a TI Professional and needed to sell his personal collection of TI99/4A equipment. This is a way for us all to sell our items and not just rely on newspaper advertising. Bob managed to sell a lot of his equipment, but the exact figures have not been compiled.

Products advertised through the MICROpendium for RYTE DATA. He explained the use of hardware/software and his printer never stopped...

COMPU-SHOP in Bremerton, Washington is owned and

operated by Dan Stevens. Dan has been active in his Kitsap User Group and branched out to form Compu-Shop, providing hardware/software sales and lessons to that area of the State. Danny brought overlays for the Geneve 9640 as well as computers to sell. He had a good array of merchandise along with a lot of patience and understanding for the NOVICE. He continues to support the TI99/4A community both in Bremerton and the surrounding area. His second year with our convention, his knowledge for the Geneve 9640 and providing these unlimited services, adds more expertise to the growing number of TI99/4A computer users in this area of the United States.

RAVE99 Keyboards, owners John and Gay McDevitt, traveled to Seattle, Washington all the way from Vernon, Ct. We have READ ABOUT THEM, but have not had the privilege of meeting them personally. They added new items to this convention. The PC style keyboard was a dream a year ago and a reality this year. A lot of interest was generated by our community to see this keyboard demonstrated. With many new products in the wind, they were able to DEMONSTRATE their INSIDE THE PE BOX Speech Synthesizer. They sold out their supply and with local purchasers having them now in their possession, we will be able to find out if this inside speech will be a compliment also to the new Geneve 9640. Hoping to see even more in the ensuing months from RAVE99, we appreciate the NEW PRODUCTS THEY BROUGHT TO US.

MYARC, INC. of Basking Ridge, New Jersey. Jack Riley, Marketing Manager arrived in Seattle to demonstrate and INTRODUCE NEW SOFTWARE AND HARDWARE FOR THE GENEVE 9640. Anticipation prevailed and the onlookers were not disappointed to SEE MY-ART and the THREE-BUTTON, BALLBEARING WHEELED MOUSE. The graphic capabilities of the mouse software was quite impressive to say the least. MDOS, utilizing the use of Jack's Quad Controller Card and drive, was loaded into the machine. This MDOS is the BETA TEST copy only, and Jack gave copies explaining that this IS NOT THE DOS that was sent to Dealers and Distributors on the previous Friday. Last minute checking of the software was being done by owner of Myarc, Inc., in New Jersey, Lou Phillips as Jack was preparing for his trip from Alabama to Seattle, Wa. However the FINAL VERSION OF MYWORD AND MULTIPLAN was presented to Seattle Dealers for distribution. The FUTURE holds, according to Jack, a possible EPROM of DOS when it is completely tested and the assurance of being

bug-free. I was most anxious and pleased to see the HARD DRIVE CONTROLLER CARD, another item PRESENTED AT THE SEATTLE CONVENTION FOR THE FIRST REVIEW. This card is completed and software is the only hold-up at the moment. Future software development by MYARC, INC. includes a more enhanced word processing program, database and spreadsheet package, purchasable, should we require more than the offered software package being provided with the purchase of the Geneve 9640. By the end of October, 1987, ALL SOFTWARE for the Geneve PACKAGE WILL BE SHIPPED to those who have sent in their warranty letters, provided for them in the white manual. Jack ANNOUNCED THAT NOW YOU CAN USE THIS MANUAL, in MOST INSTANCES to load and run the DOS. Myarc has provided updates for using the new final version of MYWORD AND MULTIPLAN, and those papers were left with the dealers, for our added help in helping customers learn to use these programs. In the not-too-distant future, plans for Myarc are to provide an alternative arrangement for housing the GENEVE 9640 in some type of stand/alone system. CURRENTLY, it is being housed the the TI Peripheral Expansion Box, and this power supply is adequate and well-built for that purpose. News letters and information will continue to be made available to consumers and dealers as new items reach their goaled deadlines.

Genial TRAVELER, owner Barry Traver from Philadelphia, Pa, flew to Seattle for his first experience of providing information and help with GENIEL TRAVELER disk magazine software. Unknown to our area, this software has been advertised in the MICROpendium, and Barry along with several East Coast programmers have compiled, put together a large, extensive and varied database of information for the novice to the expert. Barry's speech, dealing with the different types of Extended Basic modules available to us today, enhanced our knowledge of what we can do individual as well as possibly produce software for others. Again, the fairware and freemarket is not only wide-open to our suggestions and inventions, but these Extended Basic tips allow us to utilize the different types of routines available for our purchase. Barry, along with his delightful son, age 10, John Calvin will continue to travel to the different TI99/4A conventions and faires to demonstrate the outstanding capabilities of Extended Basic, Assembly, etc. software to help users better understand and gain the most use from this TI99/4A computer. Most of the software is not only available

through Barry for the 99/4A, but will graduate right on over to the Geneve 9640.
