GROUP PURCHASE OFF AND RUNNING By Lloyd Maple

I first want to thank all for the support of our new Discount Group Purchase program which was made available at our February meeting. It was announced, that every order was filled during the first month including the most elusive Extended Basic module.

Some confusion has surfaced and I would like to try to answer some of the questions. At the last meeting, I was asked what equipment was needed for one to link their computer to one or more of the networks. It is true that at the present time, one would need the Peripheral Expansion Box, RS-232 Card, a Modem, and the Terminal Emulator II Module. A pretty hefty outlay to get started if you only have the console.

For the person who cannot afford the above and/or does not see any need for further expansion of the system, hold off until the HEX System becomes available. For far less of an investment one can pick up the HEXBUS, HEX RS-232, Modem, and TE-II. Watch for availability. My guess would be May or June.

Another common question is: Do I have to wait for the next meeting to order or pickup my orders? No. You may call the Member closest to you to place or pick-up an order. For the Boulder area - call Ron 444-1797, Aurora - call either Pete 750-5949 or Bob 366-2344, or for Littleton call Lloyd 979-6677. Helpful hint: If you pay with Cash or Money Order, your order will be able to be processed quicker.

Another common question has been: Do you send off through some Mail Order firm for our orders? No. Living here in the Rockies, we are fortunate to have the only two Distributors in the area, right here in town where your orders can be quickly handled. And with two Distributors available, usually one will have the item you need. Nearly all orders can be in your hands within a week or less.

Are other items available? Yes. Other items will be listed as soon as they are available and time permits the assembling of the information. There are other items available right now. If you have need of something give a call to one of the above members for availability.

MORE ON ELECTRONIC TYPEWRITERS By Raine De Pue

In answer to the problems of February's column, there is an excellent electronic typewriter/word processor program in the December 1982 issue of 99'er Magazine. You will need extended BASIC and all necessary equipment to run a printer. This simple (tape or disk) program can be either copied (public domain) or hand entered into the computer. It is a simple program in that it will not right or left justify and you cannot just change a word in the middle of The whole line must be retyped a line. (although it will not only tell you the line is too long for whatever length you set it for, but will also display the correct amount of the line without cutting off a word in the middle). It is very easy to use and has a good variety of simple commands.

However, there are a few slight disadvantages. The chief disadvantage is that when you replace (change) a line and then go on to add more lines, it clears the screen and then only shows you the next line number, but not what was written on the line(s) before the next line. A minor problem is that it double spaces lines. That is good sometimes, but not always. I modified the program to fix this. Now I have 2 programs. One I read in and use when I want everything double spaced and the other I read in and use when I want single line spacing. To get single line to change line 2610 spacing, OPEN #1:"PIO.LF&.CR" or if you use the serial port of your RS232 card to your printer, change the line to OPEN #1:"RS232.BA= 1200. LF&CR".

It is difficult to change the print styles within a document using this program, although it can be done. However, if you want the whole letter done in a different print style, then it is easy. Just change your open statement (if you have an Epson printer) to either:

- 1. RS232 Serial OPEN #1:"RS232.BA-1200,.LF&CR, CHR\$(27)&CHRS()"
- 2. RS232 Parallel OPEN #1:"PIO.LF&CR&CHR\$(27)& CHR\$()"
- (NOTE: The blanks after the CHR\$ are for the control character for the print style you want the printer to print in.)

Even with its limitations, it is still a great program to use. I have used it to do business letters and family letters. If you have any questions, please feel free to call me at 420-2487.

Many of you have received your Free Speech Synthesizer from TI by now. If you have the Terminal Emulator II Module, you can do many interesting routines. Many thanks to Duane for the following routine:

- 10 CALL VCHAR(1,1,32,768)
- 20 OPEN #1:"SPEECH",OUTPUT
- 30 RANDOMIZE
- 40 A=INT(RND*10)+1
- 50 FOR B=1 TO A

The Pitch can be changed by typing in the format as xx yyy, in which xx is a number from 00 to 63. 00 will give you a whisper. 35 for natural speech and 63 being quite low. yyy is a number from 000 to 255 to control the slope of speech. The best slope for a given pitch is about 3.5 times the pitch number.

We have acquired many of the available program tapes listed by Texas Instruments for the 99/4(A). These are now available for check out to all members.

We established a few ground rules that must be observed to protect the group property from accidental loss or destruction.
