JOYSTICK TO KEYBOARD

The following Demo program was provided by Terry Terrass. It demonstrates the subroutine for substituting the keyboard whenever the JOYST subprogram is called in a program. The actual subroutine is contained in lines 10 through 40.

You should locate this keyboard subrouting at the beginning of your program, to speed execution. (continued on back).

Find where the subprogram JOYST is CALLED within the program. The general form of this statement is CALL JOYST (n,X,Y). Here, n refers to the joystick number (either 1 or 2) while X and Y are values returned depending on the joystick position.

X and Y may be represented by any valid numerical variable name. Note the variable names used for X and Y in the CALL JOYST statement and replace this statement with GOSUB 10 (or the start of your subroutine).

Substitute the variable names from the CALL JOYST statement into your subroutine for X and Y. If K and SS are used in your main program, you may need to name them differently in your subroutine.

As with the CALL JOYST statement, X and Y will be returned as -4, 0, or +4 in lines 20 and 30. The standard arrow keys (E,S,D and X) are tested in this routine along with W,R,Z, and C for diagonal moves. (The above instructions were summarized from the July issue of COMPUTE!).

DECIMAL TO HEX CONVERSION

The following demo program was also provided by Terry. It runs in Basic on the screen so all of us should be able to use it.

PRINT INSIGNIFICANT ZEROS

The following tip comes from Paul Randleman which he dug out of the Extended Basic Manual. Seems like everybody he asked didn't know how to get the TI to print insignificant zeros to the right of the decimal point. Paul's answer comes from page 150 and page 79 of Extended Basic, depending on which form you use:

The #'s format the display.

DATA ERROR LOCATION

This tip (slightly modified) comes from MICROpendium, August issue. It may help in locating the source of an error messages generated by the computer.

Say you've finished typing a program, you run it and get the error message: DATA ERROR IN LINE XXX. The line turns out to be a READ statement. What to do? Simple, type in PRINT X, where X is the read variable in your READ statement. Push enter, and the computer should print the last data value that was read correctly. The next value should have generated your error statement

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION CHANGES

Your Board recommends the following minor changes to our "Constitution and Operating Procedures":

1. Article 4. Fees

Current: a. Annual dues shall be twelve dollars (\$12) for each household, payable in January.

Proposed: a. Annual dues shall be twelve dollars (\$12) payable on anniversary date.

2. Article 7. Meetings

Current: a.Regular meetings will normally be scheduled on the fourth Wednesday of every month.

For those that are lucky enough to have Modems, You may want to try out TIBBS (TI Bulletin Board System) which is operated by Ralph Fowler of Kennesaw, Georgia. There is no charge for the service, other than the long-distance telephone fee. The number is (404) 425-5254.

I recently called the number and, after two or three busy signals, got through. I signed-up, listed a password, recieved an ID number. I'm still not very good with Telecommunications but I did get some preliminary information. I was not, however, able to get a Download Program listing. So, I just asked for program #1. I got the normal "transmission in progress" message, and it (a 28 sector) program was sent very fast compared to the transfer between two TE II's that I'm used to.

I was really surprised when I ran the program and it actually worked. Although it was a 1981 program (by Sam Moore Jr.) it is very well done and I had not seen it before. Give TIBBS a try.
