MINUTES

VAST User Group

September 9, 1989

The September meeting of the VAST USER GROUP was called to order by President Mike Grogan at 10:05AM. The meeting was held in it's usual place.

The minutes of the August meeting were accepted as published in the VAST Newsletter.

The Treasurer reported a bank balance of \$395.77 with an income of \$139.70 and expenses of \$272.20. The large expenses resulted from the moving of the BBS from Jim to Sue. Our BBS expenses are running about \$45 per month but the collections have been netting only a few dollars each month. It was suggested that some of the heavy users need to be a little more aware of the cost of operating the board when it comes to the BBS fund donation can.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

LIBRARY: Bud Barnes reported in Stephanie's absents that the restructuring of the listing is coming along and should be completed soon. It was suggested that the listing be made available on disk if possible. Mike Grogan said that he would upload a catalog program that will allow a disk catalog to include descriptions of each file thus making it easier to identify a program on the disk.

BBS: No report. Sue absent. It was noted that things seem to be running smoothly. Jim reminded everyone of the upload section for the newsletter. He would really like to see more contributions. He thanked those who had written articles in the last few weeks and reminded everyone about the biography he wants from us all.

PROGRAM: Dan reported that the program for October would of course be our picnic/swap. For November we will meet at Ely Ink where Jim is planning to show us how the newsletter is put together. Then in December, Dan has a GAD demo in the planning stages. A suggestion was made that maybe at the December meeting we could hold a Christmas party. Everyone liked the idea. When asked for a volunteer to head a committee to organize one, the silence was deafening so the idea was dropped.

TI: Ian had mentioned that he had spoken with Rene Mitchel of SOFWARE on Thomas Road in Phoenix. Mr. Mitchel had said he had a lot of TI software in warehouse that he would sure like tomove. We thought that if we could work out some kind of deal, perhaps we could take some of it on consignment to the FESTWEST and sell it for him. We will check on this further. The next TI SIG will be on graphics programming. Time and place to be announced later. Dan announced that Texaments has released TI ARTIST PLUS. This is an upgrade to the TI ARTIST program that is now the standard graphic program for the TI.

OTHER: Bill Wedmore reported no activity from the "other computer" committee.

PICNIC/SWAP: Stephanie absent, no report. It was agreed to give her any amount of funding she felt necessary to pull off a spiffy picnic.

PUBLICITY: No report. Chairperson absent.

DISK ORDER: Mike will place an order for 500 disks at 23¢ each. Anyone else interested in ordering some should contact Mike and prepay the order.

NEW BUSINESS

This Month's Member Profile

This month we have Mike Marfisi who was born in Buffalo, NY 40 some odd years ago. He spent about 10 years of his youth heavily involved in the scouting program where he achieved the rank of Eagle.



He attended college in Saranac Lake, NY and Boston, MA where he graduated with a degree in radio broadcasting. He spent several years spinning records as a DJ in Lake Placid, NY, Boston and Buffalo. He fell in love! He uses his TI for home record keeping, word processing and keeping track of all of his collections.

He joined VAST when it was just being formed and has served as Librarian, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer.

His hobbies include collecting 50's and 60's hit music. He has over 60 tapes full of the top hits from that period. He also collects original radio shows from the "Golden Age Of Radio" back in the days when radio was "the theater of the mind". He has over 1600 programs in my collection.

The Opinions Expressed...

In the July newsletter we were treated to an impassioned plea from our secretary concerning the path this group was taking. It was noted that the original group had changed since many of the members had moved on to computers other than the TI, and it was implied that these members had forced the format change on the TIers left in the group. Some of the TI only people complained that the TI was being shoved aside and ignored... all of this was

blamed on the change to a "generic" user group and ignored, in my opinion, any of the real problems that existed (and still do) within this group.

This group, as it stands now, supports the TI to the best of its ability. If a few more of the TI people would contribute rather than complain, even more support would be available. However, the bottom line here is the lack of participation by the TI contingent, not some "plot" by the non-TIers to take over the group. Indeed, the non-TIers remain with us as a source for TI problem solving even though many of them no longer own TIs.

In addition the group maintains a TI program library, there is no group library for any other brand of computer. The group BBS maintains a file area for TI programs, the only such area in Phoenix.

That there was lack of TI demonstrations at meetings can, in my opinion, be linked directly to the fact that few of the TI only members could be bothered to take the time to provide such programming, and those that did provide programming were tired (rightly) of being the only ones doing anything. Indeed, until our present officers were elected, the officers consisted mainly (if not entirely) of non-TI members, not because they wanted to take over but because the TI people couldn't be bothered to serve.

The open letter from our secretary in the July newsletter asked several questions and then proceeded to answer them. I'd like to take the same questions and answer them from a different perspective.

Errors.

This part is about error corrections. I don't know about you, but I am one of the world's worst typists. On a normal typewriter, I make so many typing errors it is pathetic. The ability to correct errors before the text is put to paper is one of the greatest assets of word processing. So let's talk about some of the ways to correct errors.

If you are typing along in T.I. Writer and you see that you entered the wrong letter, just use Fctn S(<-) and retype the correct letter. That's easy enough. Sometimes you will notice an entire word misspelled. Just take the cursor back to the word and type over it correctly.

Sometimes you will leave out a letter or letters in a word or even a word or words in a sentence. This correction is a little more complicated but easy enough. Place the cursor one space after the place you want to start and then press Fctn 2 (Ins Char). You will see the line split and then type your insert correction. Now you want everything closed up again and normal. You do this by pressing Ctrl 2 (Reformat). This will put everything in order. Reformatting is very handy for adding words, phrases and even sentences. Try it out, you will find it very convenient.

You can remove letters or words by putting the cursor over the character to be removed and pressing Fctn 1 (Del Char).

Sometimes you will not like a line of text. To correct this, just press Fctn 3 (Del Line) and the entire line will be erased.

Another more complicated method of correcting errors or making changes is with the SearcH directive in Command Mode. To do this, go to the Command Mode (Fctn 9) and press SH and then < enter > . You will now see "FindString or ReplaceString". Now press RS and < enter >. You will then see "Replace enter /old string/new string/:". Let's say you misspelled Brown as Brawn. To correct this, enter "/Brawn/Brown/" and press < enter >. The cursor will then stop at the first instance of "Brawn" and you will see "REPLACE STRING (Yes, No, All, Stop)?". If you want this word replaced with "Brown" press "Y" and the cursor will go to the next instance and repeat as above. If you want all instances of "Brawn" replaced with "Brown", press "A". No and Stop are self explanatory.

T.I. Writer has what is known as a Screen Editor. This means that any mistake can be corrected anywhere on the screen. Just get the cursor on the error anywhere on the screen and make the appropriate corrections. There are word processors that are only line editors, which means that you can only correct one line at a time on the screen. I feel that a screen editor is more convenient.

Try these processes to correct errors and more next time. S.K.

Question #1: Has there been an influx of new members who own and use computers other than the TI?

No, not an influx. but then we didn't get an influx of TI computer owners either, even though our secretary stated the "overwhelming majority of people who have joined VAST since the change have been TI users." Now, as far as I can tell, we acquired less than 10 new members... and to my knowledge they were pretty evenly split in computer brands.

However, our secretary's answer omitted a very important detail. There is virtually nothing done to advertise this group. Recently we acquired a new caller to our BBS, one with a four a TI systems.. a person who was completely unaware, until recently, that there was a TI support group in the city.

Obviously, if one doesn't let people know the group exists, new members, TI or otherwise, aren't going to materialize. There is a lot of talk done about advertising the group, but actual action is sadly lacking.

Case in point. At the August meeting, I mentioned a science fiction convention to be held in Scottsdale the following month. As part of this convention there is a computer room running demonstrations virtually 24 hours a day. There was potential there for attracting new members to the group. It was mentioned that "hand-out" cards would be a good idea to distribute there, as well as other places. Hand-out cards were promised prior to the convention... a full month was available for these cards to be made. (In point of fact it didn't even need to be anything fancy. Simply

using TI writer and a printer, flyers could have been made in approximately an hour.) However, come the convention, nothing to publicize the group was available.

We also maintain a club BBS. Supposedly, this has always been a tool for attracting new members, among other purposes. Personally, it was because of the friendly chatter on the BBS that I attended my first VAST meeting and joined the group. We have, in the past month or so, attracted several new people to the BBS.. people who have expressed an interest to me in attending a meeting in the future. And yet, these same people who complain about the group not growing now are complaining that non-members are on the BBS and talking about subjects that don't suit them. (One might mention that these complainers rarely call the BBS themselves and on the occasions that they do call, do little to contribute to the conversation other than to complain that it doesn't interest them.)

The once friendly atmosphere of the BBS that would induce people to come to our meetings has disintegrated into a "close it up and make it the way it was" attitude. This puzzles me since the basics of the BBS have remained the same...there is an area for general chit chat, an area for tech talk and an area for TI talk, as there always has been. Indeed, in recent weeks the TI area has been full of TI chatter by member and non-member alike. The only real change seems to be the new people and, if we are to grow, we must welcome newcomers to our midst, not close them out as not "belonging". The other areas of the BBS are being used as well. I find it hard to understand why the use of the BBS by members and non-members is such a bone of contention since, in the past, many of these same complainers complained because the BBS wasn't being used enough.

(((An aside for those not familiar with BBS structure - A message based BBS system can be compared to a newspaper... one section for news, one for sports etc. One person may want to read only the news and another may want to read only the sports. If one isn't interested in sports one needn't read the sports section. A BBS works in virtually the same way. Our BBS has a general chatter area, a TI talk area, a general computer area, a for sale area, a serious topic area, a bird area as well as a TI file section. If one only wants to read TI talk then one doesn't even have to look at the other sections, much less read them. Topics are pretty well confined to the appropriate area.)))

The bottom line is, if we do not make these newcomers welcome on our BBS then what incentive do they have to come to a meeting or join the group? And if people do not feel they will be welcomed at our meetings how are we to attract new members?

Question #2: Has the change stopped the loss of old TI'ers who have moved on to other computers?

Our secretary notes it hasn't stopped the loss and blames it on the bickering. I agree it hasn't stopped the old members from leaving but, from my view, it was because, having moved on to other computers, they grew weary of also having to be the only ones running a joint group to support TI and others with little or no help (but lots of complaints) from many of the TI contingent.

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Question #3: Has the inclusion of other computers resulted in any increase in the participation of the "other" users?

Our secretary answers this no and cites our newsletter with only one "other" contribution as proof. I find this ludicrous since, until the present officers were "elected", virtually ever post was held by one of the "other" members. That we have Tiers in some of those positions now is strictly because the "other" users refused to continue in posts held for several years.

Question #4: Has the change produced any results?

On this point the secretary and I agree. The past year was full of bickering, brought on, from my point of view, by Tlers who wanted things done for them within the framework of the group without having to expend any effort to contribute.

The July meeting showed that things could work in a generic form, committees that should have existed were formed and there have been presentations or demonstrations at the last three meetings, generic and TL

But we now are falling into the same bickering, unpleasant atmosphere on the BBS. An approsphere where the Tlers give the appearance of saying their interests are the only ones welcome on the BBS or within the group... an attitude that is driving away old faithful members as well as any potential new ones. These people seem to be determined to kill the group since it isn't run 100% to their specifications. completely disregarding that there are other members of the group with other, different, computer related interests.

In closing his remarks, our secretary declared "We want to move forward, not stand still" and yet, the attitude displayed lately is one geared to driving people, members and newcomers alike, away. They seem to be saying "our way or no way". They seem to be unwilling to allow that there are members within this group with computer related interests that don't exactly match theirs. To my eyes, it is they who are unwilling to expend any effort towards expansion or even cooperation. If new people are not made to feel welcome, if old members are driven away, the only thing accomplished will be the death of this group.

Also in his closing, our secretary very dramatically declared "WE WANT OUR USER GROUP BACK!".

In my closing, I remind him and others, that this is a group that belongs to AII of the members, not just a select few. and it is time that that select few realized they are not the only people in this group.

VIEWS AND REVIEWS COMMENT CAT

During the September meeting while we were talking about the library, someone said that it would be nice if we had a program that would list the contents of a disk and then allow us to add comments to each program title, thus discribing the program. It would make the work of the librarians so much easier. Producing a library catalog would be a much less arduous. Well along came good old Mike Grogan with an upload that answered our prayer. The program is called COMMENT CAT. Mike says that he has no idea who wrote it but he made a few improvements.

This program opens with a title screen that prompts you for the disk driveyou wish to catalog. The next screen is the main work screen. After the program scans the disk, you are presented with a listing of the first 10 programs on the disk. The screen also shows disk name, number of used and free sectors and how many pages the listing will contain. In the bottom area you will find a menu. From here you choose the function you wish to perform. Choices are delete (eliminate file fron disk), rescan (relist the disk contents), forward (page forward to next group of programs), ld & run (run the selected program), print (print catalog), Exit, back (page backwards), and comment (add comments).

Select the function you wish to perform by pressing the first letter of thecommand. A word of caution here. If you'are planning to delete any files, do so before adding comments. If you don't, you

will find that your printout is not accurate.

The main purpose of this program is, of course, to add comments to the program listing. Selecting "C" from the menu promts you for the number of the program for which you wish to add a comment. The programs are listed on the top of the screen, each page listing 10 programs. Once a program number is selected, two lines appear at the bottom of the screen. You can now type in up to 48 characters describing the program or make any other notes you wish.

After you have completed all the notes you wish included, specifying "program" at the "next comment" prompt will return you to the main menu from which you would select "P" for print. Answer the "printer type" prompt and sit back and watch a "disk manager" type printout but with all of your special comments printed to the right of each program listing.

After printing, you can continue with another listing by selecting "R" for rescan or you can quit by selecting "E" for exit.

This is not a spectacular program with lots of bells etc. but it sure does the job for which it is intended. Thanks Mike G. The program is on the BBS as COMM/CAT or will be available from the library.

OUR BBS AND YOU WHAT IS FC PURSUIT

Those of us who use the computer to communicate with bulletin boards in other cities know the feeling of panic that sets in when the monthly phone bill arrives. Calling BBS's long distance can be a costly proposition. It is even more so for a BBS SySop. Text files and software don't grow on trees after all, and supplying a BBS with both, means LOTS OF CALLs. Until now, my monthly phone bill for computer-related calls has hovered in the \$75-\$100 range. My wife, meanwhile, has hovered over me with intent to do bodily harm, if the bills kept coming in that high! Luckily, some one at Telenet had a great idea. They call it PC PURSUIT.

What PC PURSUIT amounts to is a way to make unlimited long distance calls to computer BBS's in certain areas for a flat fee of \$25 a month!!!

HERE'S HOW IT WORKS: First you call your local TELENET access number (usually 1 number for 300/1200 baud and another for 2400 if it's available). When your computer connects, you choose the area code you are calling and the speed you will use, then enter your ID# and Password. Upon connection to the terminal in the area code you want, you simply treat the system as if you were dialing from your modem. If you get a CONNECT on your screen, you are online and can stay that way as long as you wish. (\$25 flat rate, remember?). If the system you are calling is busy, the word BUSY will appear on your screen. You can then enter a "?", the nornal Hayes command for re-dial, and keep trying till you get a connect. When you are finished with your session, you can disconnect from the area code you were calling and connect with another to make more calls.

NOW, HERE ARE THE DRAW-BACKS. While you can access PCP from any city with a TELENET number, you can ONLY call areas that have been set up with the necessary equipment. To date, only 25 cities are so equipped; Los Angeles, Tampa, Chicago, and others teeming with BBS's. NEXT, PCP charges you one of two ways. Either by regular

monthly postings to the credit card of your choice, or by automatic withdrawals from you checking account. They believe that avoiding a monthly mailed bill helps keep the costs down. LASTLY, some of the most heavily used area codes or "nodes" do not have enough lines for easy access. A call to the 202 area can take several hours to get through, because of the limited number of access lines.

The Bonuses are obvious!! Unlimited length and number of calls to PCP cities! No matter how many calls you make, you pay (\$25) per month MAX!!!!

ONE IMPORTANT NOTE: PCP has NOTHING to do with CompuServe, The Source, Delphi or GEnie. They all have there own access numbers.

Since I received my PCP access in mid Oct.,1988, I have logged onto BBS's in Phoenix, Arizona; Seattle, Washington; Miami, Florida; Philadelphia, PA.; Atlanta, Georgia, and Dallas, Texas. I can now converse regularly with Stu Olson, Walt Howe, Paul Charlton and many others whose names are very familiar to the TI world. Is PCP PURSUIT worth it? After reading the above, you be the JUDGE?




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
