This is YOUR disk library.

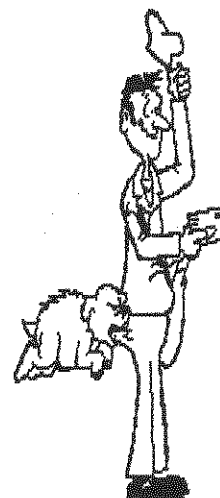

MAILING LIST MANAGER V.1.1

Bill Gaskill

Bill Gaskill announced the release of Mailing List Manager on March 6, 1995. As the name implies, MLM is designed to manage home and small business mailing lists.

Although MLM is a full-featured productivity tool, Gaskill says he wrote the program with ease-of-use always at the top of the features list.

MLM offers the user unlimited file sizes, highly readable inverse video field names and prompts, a lightning quick assembly language file sort, 18 menu options divided into two screens, single-key-press selection of any item on either menu, and single-key-press switching between the two screens.

Menu options include the ability to Add, Browse, Delete, Find, Globally Delete, Index, Merge, Report, Sort and Create Subfiles. MLM also provides for envelope addressing, Columnar, Label, or Rolodex type report printing.

If you don't really have the time or desire to learn yet another piece of software for your TI-99/4A, MLM has a Label Editor that lets you design, save and print up to 19 mailing labels, so you can print labels without having to learn any other part of the program. A custom Label Maker is also included that does up to 99 mailing labels, disk labels or warning labels in one pass.

MLM also has Contact/Correspondence Management capabilities that allow you to attach up to 114 lines of free form text to any record in your mailing list. The text is also fully searchable and printable via a name, word, or phrase in a file or range of files.

Finally, MLM allows data to be exported in ready-made TI-Writer Value Files for mail merging with form letters.

Mailing List Manager requires 32K RAM, Extended Basic, at least 1 disk drive of any density and a printer if hard-copy output is desired. It is also immediately useable from any valid Horizon Randisk drive (1-9, A-2).

This program is available from our club library for try-before-you-buy purposes or directly from the author for a \$15.00 shareware fee.

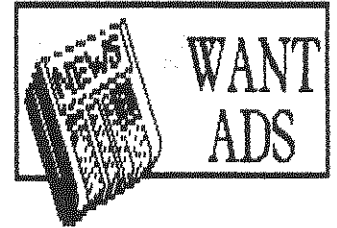

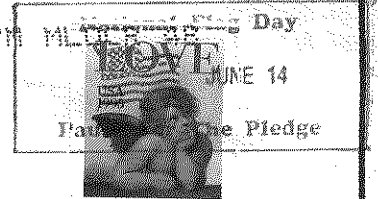
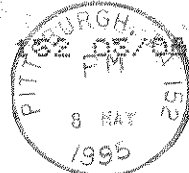
