Release date of Version 1.0 is expected to be at the TI New England Fair on September 30th, with backup release dates set for the Chicago show on October 28th, and Fest West '96 on February 17th.

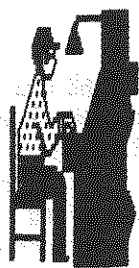

UPDATING THE MEMBERSHIP

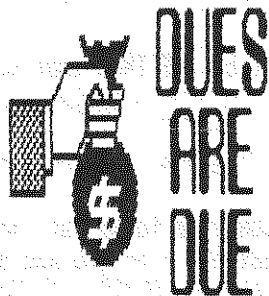
Would you believe that for the first time this year we have no changes to report in our membership status.

...We still have 13 people who have yet to renew their memberships for the 1995 season.

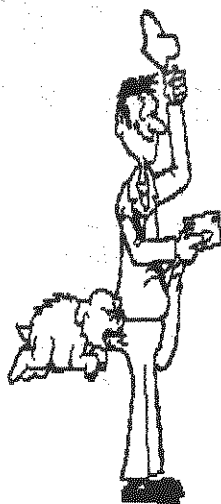

This month has been pretty good as far as the mail goes.

(At least for yours truly, on a personal basis).

Let me explain...

First, I received a letter from Williamsport, Pa, from fellow member Craig Burkey.

He wrote...

Dear Mickey,

Enclosed please find a copy of the user's guide from my Seiksha GP-100 printer. I have seen your plea each month for the printer codes for a SP-100DAP and I'm not sure if any of this info will do you any good but I thought it might be worth a shot.

I purchased this printer and the Axiom interface a few years ago when a gentleman about 30 miles from me sold all of his TI stuff. I bought a large Chevy Station Wagon full of stuff for \$500 and this was

part of the haul. I was very disappointed with this set up however because I could never get my favorite program (Graphx) to print through it. Imagine my pure delight however when I bought a Star NX1000 printer several years later and the Axiom interface enabled me to print anything and everything with the Star.

I have truly enjoyed receiving the West Penn 99'ers newsletter and I hope to make a trip to one of your meetings before the year ends. I am hoping for the September one.

I have a real good understanding of hard drives and how they work because I use an IBM at work and it has DOS, Windows, Microsoft Office, etc. The problem I have is I don't know a thing about the hard drives that are being used on the TI. I am familiar with a few names, but where do you get this stuff, how much of an investment is it, and how is it installed?

These are things I wish I could find out. If you could maybe get a member with this info to do an article in the newsletter, I am sure I am not the only one who is in the dark on this stuff. I read my Micropendium and find that a lot of it is in Computer Klingon. Any help or advise would be appreciated.

Dear Craig,

First, let me thank you for sending me a copy of your printer manual.

Although I haven't had the time to check the codes out with my printer yet, I will soon.

I'll let you know next month (by way of our newsletter) if I was successful or not.

As for your hard drive questions - I have very little knowledge of things HARDWARE, but since I do OWN a hard drive, I can tell you a little.

First, in order to use a hard drive on your TI, you need to have a hard drive controller card (much like your disk controller card).

I have a NYARC hard and floppy controller card. (It's one card which controls both my hard drive and my two half-height floppy drives).

Simply put, the hard and floppy controller card fits into your P-Box, in place of the disk controller card that is in your P-Box now.

As for the hard drive, I have a Seagate 20 Meg, Model ST-225, which has its own power supply. (This is a separate unit, about 1/3 the size of the P-Box).

Cables go from the hard drive to the hard and floppy controller card,

and from the hard and floppy controller card to the floppy drives.

I purchased everything altogether from one individual, (including software) for \$185.00.

I'm not sure where you can still purchase these items, (especially new ones), but maybe someone out there reading this article could help.

Your best bet for now would be to run an ad in our newsletter, stating that you are looking for such an item.

There is no charge for this service, and no time limit either, so if you want to run an ad, just mail me a copy of your ad and I will be happy to include it in our next newsletter...until you have found someone who has one that they are willing to sell.

Anyway, I hope that this information answers most of your questions, at least to some extent. Like I said, I AM NOT a HARDWARE person, but perhaps I explained things enough.

Next, I received a letter from Oshawa, Ontario, Canada, from fellow TI friend, Tom Jakabfy.

He wrote...

Dear Mickey,

I thought that I would write regarding the NEW UTILITY that you are writing for the TI, using a MOUSE, and an update for your RECORD books.

I don't know what the "utility" is that you are writing, but I would guess that it is PAGE PRO RELATED! If it is, maybe it is a program which allows the user to change from TIPS to PAGE PRO PIX in a single shot without having to do the entire disk like the TIPS2PPRO program. This would be nice. And of course once you've done this, a way to convert in the opposite way might be called for too. It would also be nice to be able to VIEW the TIPS that you are converting as well. Well, you did ask for input.

While we are talking about programs, I am enclosing one that I wrote while laid up from an operation last year. It is called SEARCH! It is on this disk so that you can play with it. It would have been nice if I had the WINDOWS program when I wrote this. I have played around with WINDOWS and it is very nice. The only problem is in the fact that once a window is erased, it's gone forever. At any rate, the program SEARCH is a useful tool.

Docs are on the disk.

We were looking at the records from your newsletter and came upon the record for BACKSTEINE. My son thought that he could beat the record, so one afternoon he sat down and started to play it. After about an hour he had gone as far as he could. Level 49 and 155900 points. His name is Steven Jakabfy and he is a member of our club (OSHTI User Group). Maybe you can update the records in the future. We need some Canadian involvement, eh?

Hope your programming goes smoothly.

I have to mention that I have my SCSI up and running. I am using a GENEVE since I suspected that the TI version would be "slow" in coming...it's August and still no EPROM, although I have read e-mail saying that a beta version is undergoing tests. Since I don't have to wait and see, I can tell you that my Quantum 52 Meg SCSI is as fast as a Horizon Ram Disk! Of course, this is a 3 1/2 drive and I guess it's faster than some of the older SCSIs. I am very pleased with the GENEVE (so far). It's like having a P-Card, 80 Column Card, Print-Buffer, Clock, and Ram Disk in one. The only problem is getting an RGB monitor...hard to find! If you want to see PAGE PRO really FLY (3 1/4 times faster) with the vast capacity of the SCSI hard drive then this is the ticket.

Well, I better end this and get it into the mail.

P.S.

In answer to one of your reader's questions about transferring TIPS to PAGE PRO, this is what I have found to be the fastest and most economical way.

Select the TIPS pic from a printout. Have the diskname and picture name written down. Then use the utility program (in c-99) CTIPS_IA. This will transfer any TIPS pix directly to a TI-Artist INSTANCE!

Next, use PIXPRO to load the instance file and CROP it the way that you wish and then save as a Page Pro pix. I do this every month for the newsletter and I have one disk that I use for TI Instances and another for Page Pro pix.

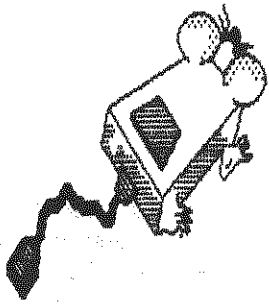
The beauty of these programs is that they are FAST and you only have to take the TIPS that you want.

IN MICKEY'S HOUSE?

PART 4

This month I thought that I would take a slightly different approach than my mouse articles in the past.

Rather than explain some of MY PERSONAL EXPERIENCES, I thought that I might ask YOU, the reader, about YOUR PERSONAL EXPERIENCES with a mouse.

So, let's get started...

I believe that there were a total of three different mice which would work on our TI-99/4A computers...

These three being...

The MYARC Mouse
The Asgard Mouse
and The Horizon Mouse

Can anyone out there confirm this information - or provide me with the correct

information. (Bear in mind that I am interested only in information that pertains to the TI-99/4A computer and NOT the Geneva computer).

I know for a fact that the Horizon Mouse will work with Asgard Software's Page Pro Composer program and Asgard Software's TI-Pei game.

Additionally, the Horizon Mouse is supposed to work with Texament's TI-Artist and Asgard Software's YAPP program, but I have yet to try my mouse with either of these two programs.

Can anyone shed some light on how the mouse works with TI-Artist and YAPP.

How about other programs that exist making use of our mice.

Can anyone provide me with a list of other programs that will work with the mouse (and where one might obtain them).

In my own personal quest in writing Mouse Works V.1.0, (a utility program which is "Mouse Driven" and "Window Sensitive" - I've been quite successful, except for one very important detail - I am still waiting for an updated Mouse DSR code disk from Mike Maksimik which will allow me to imbed the Mouse DSR code into my Extended BASIC program.

Once that disk arrives, it should not be too difficult to add the mouse routines into my program, since my program is done and fully functional, (using keyboard input in place of the mouse input).

The reason that I brought up the fact about having to wait for a new updated Mouse DSR code disk from Mike Maksimik is not to pick on Mike (or Bud Mills) but rather more in awe that I seem to have been the only one to have encountered the problems that I have been having writing my software, that SHOULD HAVE HAPPENED to anyone else before me, who was trying to imbed the Mouse DSR code into their Extended BASIC program...

So...

what about the rest of you.

Surely, I am not the only one who has tried to do this...or am I...

I'd sure love to hear from anyone who has successfully imbedded their Mouse DSR code into their Extended BASIC program...

Heck, I'd even enjoy hearing from anyone who has even just TRIED!

(At this point, I'm beginning to think that I'm the only one who is trying to do such a thing).

If that's the case, what are all you people using your mouse for...

...or has your mouse become one of those "toys" that you just had to have - that sits idle today.

I'd enjoy hearing from anyone who would like to share a little of their "Mouse Knowledge" with me (and the

rest of the TI Community.

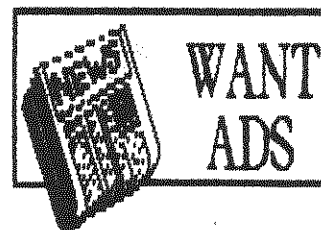

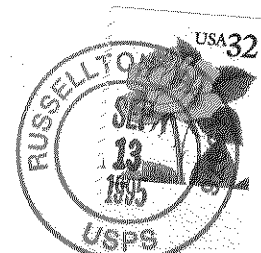
