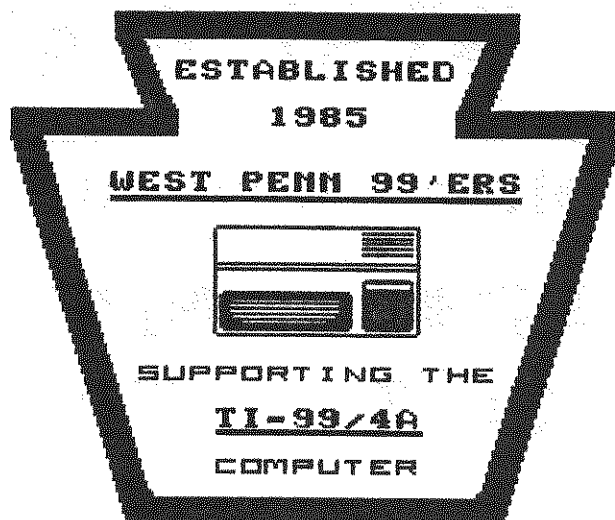

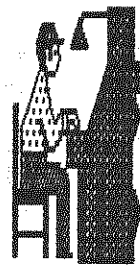

MARCH MINUTES

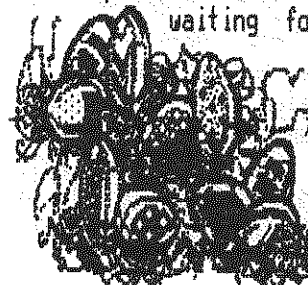

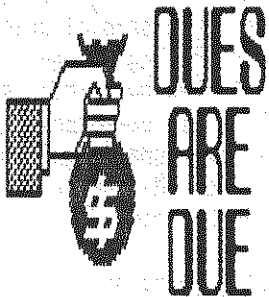

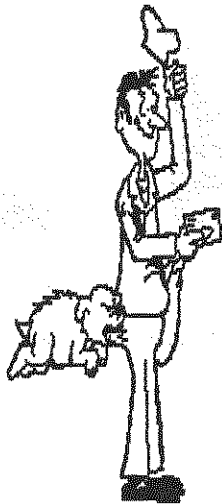

You and your group sure put out a good looking newsletter! I just wish I could do the same. Our club did not do me a favor when they bought me an Epson Stylus 800+ printer. Graphics are almost impossible on the printer when using a II. (The printing comes out way too light). The commands for graphic printing are out of this world! Maybe if I were more knowledgeable I could do it, but the older I get the less I seem to know!

I am working on a printing command file for use while making up our newsletter. I found that it helped to have a program that would allow me to set margins, line spacing, fonts, etc. Most of the time I use PRINTALL18, my version of Jim Peterson's PRINTALL16, but when printing Meredith Beyer's articles, "Playing With Numbers", I found that I needed more control of the fonts and special features like "Outline with Shadow". I gather from reading newsletters from other groups that my problems with ink jet printers

are not unusual.

By the way, if you can ever find the time, I sure would like to know the procedure you go through in putting together your newsletter. I did order PAGE PRO, but have to learn how to use it. I know that our group here would like to have a better looking newsletter, so I am open to suggestions.

Thanks for the correction concerning your club's ZIP code. I will see to it that it gets corrected.

Also, thank you for the very kind words concerning our club's newsletter.

Although I get material, "WHERE EVER I CAN", putting the newsletter together is a one-woman job. (Although my husband does help me with the copying, folding, stapling, labeling, and mailing).

The programs that I use in putting together our newsletter are PAGE PRO 99 and PAGE PRO COMPOSER, both of which were Asgard Software products.

They should still be available from Ron Markus of RANCharged Computers.

As far as the actual print-outs go, I print the newsletter out on my Seikosha SP-1200AS Serial Printer, which is a 9-pin dot matrix printer.

I would love to be able to print the newsletter out using my Canon BJ-200ex bubble-jet printer, but I have not been 100 percent successful (to-date) in this endeavor.

I'm still not giving up on the idea, but with all of my other projects in the works right now, this project will just have to sit on the back burner for awhile.

After seeing your printer command chart in the January 1996 newsletter and also a recent article in Micropendium, I decided to give the escape codes a try on the II. As you can see from the letter-head and the enclosed sheet, they work quite well. So you don't think this is some kook fooling around with a fancy program on a (??), I have enclosed a DSSD disk with a few DVB0 files on it, including this letter. You can get the codes right from the disk. They are for a Star NX-2420 Rainbow, in the Epson LQ 860 emulation mode.

OK, now I need some help. As you can see from the file ASCIICHAR I had Funnelweb in the 8-bit all-character mode. Didn't think all those odd characters would show up on the II screen, but they did,

Dear Mickey, (letter #2)

Last month I wrote and asked if anyone knew how to invoke the 8-bit all-character mode of Funnelweb. Well, I got that one figured out. It was just a case of reading the docu-

mentation properly. The , has to be taken literally, not as punctuation. Enclosed is a page with the extended character set, decimal and hex numbers and key presses necessary. Also a separate sheet with the drawing characters only and the key presses. These are not in numerical order, but a logical order as may be needed for drawing boxes, charts, etc.

The disk contains a word search program from Bruce Harrison, which he just wrote this February. So you may not have it in your library yet. This has got to be one of the quickest, nicest little programs I have ever used. We've had a lot of fun playing around with it. One sample enclosed. The sort utility part of it is also good for sorting a long list of anything that may need sorted. Very quick and easy to use. If anyone else finds this program as nice as we have, Bruce would appreciate a note of THANKS!

This is my first use of a brand new (almost) console. One of the beige ones that was just purchased yesterday. The keyboard is a lot smoother to use and eliminates the double key hits. The on/off switch is also much easier to use. Otherwise about the same.

Also made up a printer control code list which is enclosed.

That's it for now/gotta run.

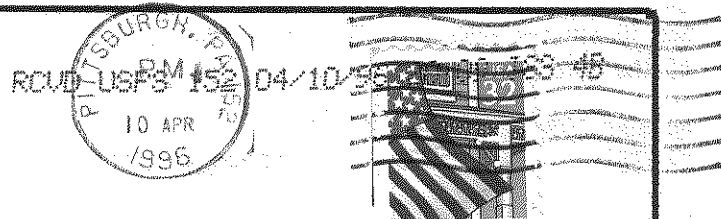
